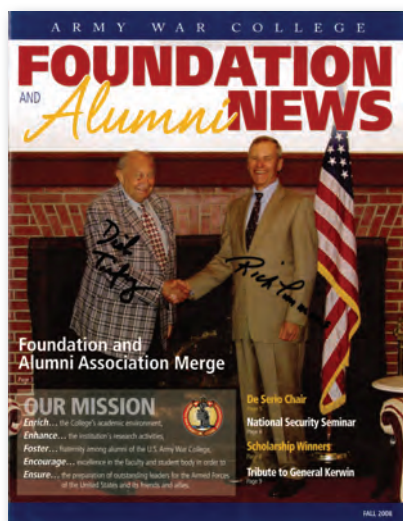
FOUNDATION BOARD OF TRUSTEES MARCH 2017

I know that it is old news, but last month brought a big win for the Army War College at the 2017 Jim Thorpe Sports Days! The resident class really came together and brought home not only the Commandant's Cup, but championship trophies for Soccer, Volleyball, Trap Shooting, Basketball, Golf, Cycling, Tennis, and the 5K Run! Spirited competition from all, but the aging athletes of the Class of 2017 did great and the sportsmanship and camaraderie were exemplary. The spirited performances must have been fueled by the release of pent up energy and anxiety after finishing oral comprehensive exams and turning in their strategy research paper in March!

There is so much going on at your Army War College this Spring that I am pressed to do it all justice in this column. As you know, our *raison d'être* is to develop strategic leaders and ideas that are both invaluable to the Army, Joint Force, and the Nation. The team here is doing just that and so hitting the wave tops will have to suffice.

The 100th anniversary of the American entrance into WWI has brought the Army War College into the fore on several fronts. The Army Heritage and Education Center just opened a wonderful new exhibit on the American experience in the First World War in the new wing....beautifully done. A couple of our faculty, among them Mike Neiberg and Doug Mastriano, have been in speaking demand for their works on the war. It is very heartening for me to see the nation recognize the quality of our faculty. COL Pete Crean and his team are working on a concept for a multi-year project to digitize the archive holdings to make them widely accessible.



As you may know, last June the Chief of Staff of the Army put general officer education under the Army War College and within the past ten months, we have dramatically revamped the core education of all Army general officers, regardless of component. This is a big deal, because we can now bring better coherency between what we teach in the Senior Service College and what is needed in our general officers. COL Mark O'Donnell and COL Chris Beckert have been instrumental in this huge effort (see page 21).

The Army is asking us to help do more of the thinking for the enterprise, which is hugely positive and reflects the subjective value of the Army War College. We are completing eight integrated research projects this May, each of which was requested by the CSA, General Mark Milley. Likewise, in May and June, we will run a very high level strategic war game looking at a potential conventional war against a near-peer foe. Our Peacekeeping and Stability Operations Institute has led a number of high level conferences and workshops as the US government lead in those areas. The staff, faculty, and students involved in all of these endeavors are making direct contributions to top level Army thinking on tough, complex problems.

The US Army War College is now much more accessible to those outside of DoD with our migration to the .edu domain, our new Publications website through the Strategic Studies Institute, and "War Room," the blog site started by Dr. Andrew Hill and the site in which we can help inform the public on highly topical national security issues. We could have the greatest thinkers and writers in the country, but if folks don't read our stuff, it is for naught. I applaud the very heavy lifting of COL Ken Adgie, Doug Lovelace, Jason Hester, and many others to bring us to this point in 21st Century scholarship access.



In the school house, Dean Richard Lacquement and Dr. Clay Chun will graduate the first set of distance students with the Joint Professional Military Education Level II this July....the same qualification that is earned by the resident students. While still an evolving effort, getting a proportion of our DDE students this certification is long overdue. Next step is 100% JPME II for all resident and distance students, which will be a huge step forward and well-deserved!

Also in the schoolhouse, this coming summer we will welcome the largest International Fellow population ever to enter the Army War College and 38 of them are here now, beginning the academic prep course to help get them ready for graduate level studies in

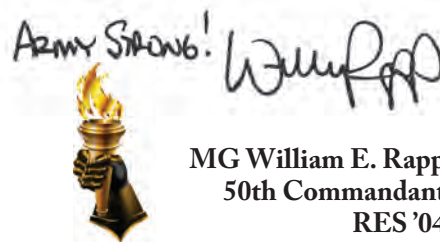

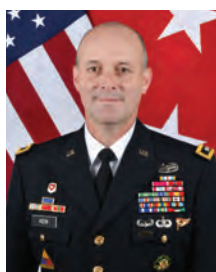

KEY POSITION SELECTIONS ANNOUNCED



Inbound Commandant

MG John S. Kem has been selected as the 51st Commandant of the U.S. Army War College and will arrive this summer. He became the first Provost of the Army University in 2015 and is also Deputy Commandant of the Command and General Staff College (CGSC) at Ft. Leavenworth, KS. As such, he is responsible for the day-to-day operations of CGSC and the following other schools: School of Advanced Military Studies, School for Command Preparation, and Army Management Staff College all at Fort Leavenworth, as well as the Western Hemisphere Institute for Security Cooperation at Fort Benning, GA, and the Warrant Officer Career College at Fort Rucker, AL.

MG Kem was commissioned through the U.S. Military Academy where he graduated as a distinguished cadet and earned a bachelor's degree in Civil Engineering. He later earned a Master's of Science in Environmental Engineering, and a Masters of Business Administration from Northwestern University and the Kellogg Business School. His military education includes Engineer Officer Basic Course, Engineer Officer Advanced Course, Army Command and General Staff College, and the Industrial College of the Armed Forces where he earned a Master's of Science in National Resource Management. He is a registered Professional Engineer in Virginia and a Chartered Financial Analyst.

Kem was born in Chicago and is married and has three children.



Inbound Provost

The 2nd Provost for the U.S. Army War College will be Dr. James G. Breckenridge, also this summer. He is currently Dean of the Ridge College of Intelligence Studies and Applied Sciences at Mercyhurst University; and Executive Director of the college's Institute for Intelligence Studies, both in Erie, PA. As the Ridge College Dean, he created an interdisciplinary program incorporating intelligence studies, forensic science, business, math, computer science, criminal justice, political science, sociology, and communication. Applying the Ridge College emphasis on interagency work, he developed effective partnerships with the Department of State and networks of experts in national security policy, business strategy, and law enforcement.

Dr. Breckenridge served in the U.S. Army, retiring in 1998 after assignments in Europe, the Middle East, and the U.S., including service at the U.S. Military Academy, 1987-1990, as course director of the World History Program. He has published in multiple forums about the field and practice of intelligence, and has presented extensively at academic and practitioner conferences. He is a tenured full professor with a doctorate in Organizational Learning and Leadership, and a master's in Business Administration at Gannon University. He holds master's and bachelor's degrees in History from the University of Virginia and Virginia Tech. Dr. Breckenridge and his wife have three adult daughters and four grandchildren.

We had a wonderful turnout of Tampa-area grads and friends of the College who were able to hear the latest USAWC news from the 50th Commandant, **MG William E. Rapp, RES '04**. Among the highlights of MG Rapp's presentation

were three "clips" from a recently-discovered YouTube video (thanks to LTC Doug Owens, DDE '17) featuring the Class of 1957 and titled "What Makes a General." It was part of the Army's Public Service Announcement-type TV series, "The Big Picture," which ran from the early fifties to the early seventies.

We do not have room to publish all the names of the attendees at the Tampa dinner but we think you'll recognize lots of faces below. Our Alumni Dinner next March 2018 will be held in the Washington, DC area, so stay tuned!



SCHOOL OF STRATEGIC LANDPOWER (SSL) – DEAN’S MESSAGE

It is always a pleasure to step back from our day-to-day engagements to reflect on SSL’s many endeavors and to share highlights with you about the many ways in which students, faculty, and staff contribute to national security.

Both the Resident and Distance Classes of 2017 are well on their way to successful program completion. Building on the powerful traditions and strong foundations that have long marked the Army War College, our students now benefit from several initiatives we’ve implemented in the past few years to include: Oral Comprehensive Exams, the Introduction to Strategic Studies Course, the Global Security Symposium, the Joint Studies Program, Integrated Research Projects, and new simulations and exercises, as well as many other modest changes.

A key endeavor during AY 2018 will be to take stock of these changes and take a close look at ourselves and where we think we need to go in the future. In particular, we will leverage our Master’s Degree reaccreditation process (scheduled revalidation in 2019) to conduct a thorough self-study and consider modifications for AY19 and beyond. Using the process required by our regional accreditation agency, the Middle States Commission on Higher Education (MSCHE), we will build committees of faculty and staff to study the major elements of what we do, identify potential gaps, and develop recommendations to strengthen our programs.

We continue to make progress in gaining Army and Joint Staff support for Joint Professional Military Education (JPME) II accreditation for the Distance Education Program. The first cohort of students in the Class of 2017 is on track to graduate this summer. We will configure the second cohort from among select U.S. Army officers and their sister-service counterparts to continue the program with the Class of 2018. If all goes smoothly, we anticipate formal Joint Staff accreditation in June 2018.

We are in the second year of implementing Integrated Research Projects (IRPs) to connect student and faculty intellectual activity in advancing knowledge while serving the needs of the Army, Joint Force, and Nation. This year, SSL faculty and students are actively pursuing seven research efforts on topics such as “Defense Reform: Command Structure, Personnel, Acquisition, Force Generation” (a research project for SSL’s Carlisle Scholar’s Program led by **Dr. Andrew Hill, Dr. Paul Kan, and Col Doug Douds, RES ‘10**); “The Army’s Ability to Fight a Great Power War” (research team includes SSL students led by SSI’s **Dr. Antulio Echevarria, DDE ‘02**); “Implications of the ‘Third Offset Strategy’ for the Army” (with student members of the elective Futures Seminar

led by CSL’s **Prof. Sam White, RES ‘07**); “Risk and Assessment in Contemporary Defense Strategy” (SSL students led by SSI’s **Prof. Nate Freier**); “Translate Strategic Direction into Operational Planning” (including students led by PKSOT’s **Prof. Bill Flavin, USAWCF ‘91**); “Strategic Rebalance toward Asia-Pacific” (with students led by SSI’s **Dr. David Lai**); and a faculty-only project “Building Partner Capacity in Africa: Keys to Success” (led by **Dr. Frank Jones** in DNSS). As with last year, the intellectual energy from students and faculty offers promising contributions to the toughest national security challenges.

SSL continued to engage with the People’s Liberation Army (PLA) of the People’s Republic of China (PRC). In December 2016, SSL faculty and students joined others from across the USAWC to meet with and discuss key security issues with counterparts from the PLA’s Academy of Military Science. The title for this year’s 3rd annual military-to-military education and research exchange was “Between War and Peace: Reflections on U.S.-China Security Relations.” SSL participants (and their topics) included **COL Bob Hamilton, USAWCF ‘09**, DNSS (U.S. National Security Strategy Policy Formulation and Structure), **Prof. Al Lord, RES ‘03**, DMSPO (South China Sea Crisis Management), **COL Eric Young, RES ‘17** (Asia Multilateral Security Architecture), and me (Korean Peninsula Crisis Management).

We completed another successful National Security Staff Ride to New York City April 5-7, 2017. Below are the State Adjutants General who are USAWC graduates, in alphabetical order by state or territory.



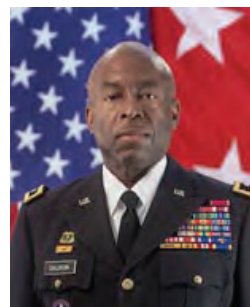

AUSA VISIT FOR USAWC FELLOWS

DC-based 2017 CSA Senior and USAWC Fellows met at AUSA headquarters on May 2, 2017 at the invitation of AUSA President GEN (Ret) Carter Ham, to discuss the Fellows' experiences from their year at multiple hosting organizations, and what AUSA might do to assist their successors as ambassadors of the Army. **LTG Gary H. Cheek, RES '02**, Director of the Army Staff, was also in attendance (center in uniform) to provide an update on Army equities.



U.S. ARMY HERITAGE AND EDUCATION CENTER

In my capacity as Director, I often speak with people from the area about what we are doing at the U.S. Army Heritage and Education Center (USAHEC). They usually tell me about their child's recent school trip or how much they enjoy visiting the Heritage Trail. At some point they say, "I haven't been there in a long time and need to plan another visit. Is there anything new?"

If you have not been to the USAHEC recently, you will be amazed. The expansion last October added dining area for Café Cumberland, two multi-purpose meeting rooms, and 1,500 square feet of exhibit space. The multi-purpose rooms are already proving to be popular and add value to USAHEC's ability to support visiting groups.

The USAHEC recently won the "Best (attraction) in the Valley" award from the Cumberland Valley Visitors Bureau and set a new record for visitation in 2016. We had more than 195,000 visitors last year and with new exhibits and events coming this year, 2017 could push us



over 200,000. This year marks the 100th anniversary of the U.S. entry into WWI and we opened a new exhibit marking the event on April 6th. Located in our new exhibit space, "Goodbye Broadway, Hello France" tells the

story of the country's participation in WWI through the eyes of American Soldiers. I am particularly proud of our team because this is the largest exhibit we have designed and built entirely in-house.

In March, we completed the "On Patrol" exhibit. This is an immersive exhibit that takes you along with Soldiers in Afghanistan and Iraq through their deployment. Using rich imagery, sounds from the streets of Iraq, and figures in uniform, "On Patrol" is already getting great reviews from veterans who served in the Middle East over the past 14 years.



The USAHEC is expanding its reach in other ways, too. For the last 49 years, we have hosted the monthly Perspectives in Military History lecture series, bringing leading authors and historians to the area. Utilizing the skills of our Visitor and Education Services (VES) team, we are now releasing the lecture series in Podcast form. By expanding to a digital format, the number of people listening to the lectures has increased sevenfold. You may access the USAHEC podcasts through either the iTunes or Stitcher websites and, like all of our events, they are free.

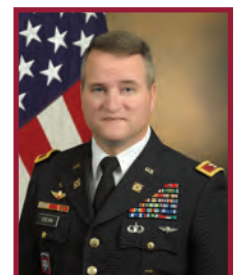


completed a number of studies covering topics as wide ranging as how the Army defines its posture to a historical commentary on the Army's emerging Mission Command doctrine. We were pleased to have **GEN (Ret) David Petraeus, USAWCF '95**, join **Dr. Conrad C. Crane, DCS '95**, on a discussion panel for Dr. Crane's recently released book, *Cassandra in Oz*. His book is about his experience leading the team that developed Field Manual 3-24, *Counterinsurgency*, and its implementation in Iraq.

The Army War College library, the Army's largest library, has been busy cataloging over 1,000 new materials in order to make them available to our patrons. In the process of cataloging our vast periodical collection, the librarians identified an original paper covering George Washington's inauguration in 1789. I am always impressed by the richness of our holdings and the talent and professionalism of our staff entrusted with their care.



This spring marks the 50th Anniversary of the Military History Institute. We're planning a couple of events to mark the occasion and I cannot think of a better way to honor our predecessors than by embarking on a program to digitize and make available all of our archival holdings on the Internet. It is difficult to convey the magnitude of this undertaking. As you may know, we hold roughly 12 million documents and well over 1 ½ million photographs. In addition to the documents normally associated with an archive, we have the largest American Civil War photograph collection in the world, hold the U.S. Army Signal Corps photograph collection from WWII, and have thousands of oral histories, films, and sound recordings. All of these must be handled differently in order to make them available online. We are in the early stages of the project and are working with other institutions that have similar projects in order to determine the best path forward. The USAHEC Digitization Project involves all branches of the organization and will take years and millions of dollars to complete. In the end, we will be at the leading edge of historical institutions with online resources.

The Peacekeeping and Stability Operations Institute (PKSOI) has consistently remained engaged with its interagency partners in mitigating challenges for Peace and Stability Operations and supporting the USAWC. Serving as the Joint Proponent for Peacekeeping and Stability Operations, PKSOI wrote a substantive portion of the HQDA 3/5/7 Stability Assessment input to OSD (P) Special Operations and Low Intensity Conflict (SOLIC) as a part of the overall DoD Stability assessment. PKSOI worked closely with OSD (P) SOLIC, the DoS Bureau of Conflict and Stabilization Operations, and USAID's Bureau for Democracy, Conflict and Humanitarian Assistance to create a document outlining the feasibility and challenges for Sustainable Stability. The document addresses necessary changes to prevent or mitigate future armed conflict in fragile and conflict-affected states. In collaboration with the U.S. Institute for Peace, PKSOI is examining three foundational stability and reconstruction documents for potential revision, combination, and presentation in a more modern media format. Those documents are *The Guiding Principles for Stabilization and Reconstruction*, *Measuring Progress in Conflict Environments* and the *Guide for Participants in Peace, Stability and Relief Operations*.

As part of PKSOI's engagement strategy, we hosted a Challenges Forum Workshop at the Army Heritage and Education Center from February 28-March 1, 2017 on "Taking Leadership to the Next Level: UN Peace Operations 2020." The Geneva Center for Security Policy co-hosted the conference, which was directed by the Challenges Forum Secretariat under the guidance of Sweden's Folke Bernadotte Academy. The institute hosted 70 people from 20 countries and over 30 partner organizations including significant participation from the UN Secretariat. The panel and breakout groups addressed the "why" and "what" of leadership, as well as available training for improving leadership in UN Peace operations. The workshop concluded with Challenges partners identifying a way-ahead strategy supporting a two-year leadership training plan.

On October 20, 2016, PKSOI hosted the second U.S./Peoples Republic of China Peacekeeping Technical Experts Meeting, comprised of members of China's Ministry of National Defense (MND) and Ministry of Public Security, to include the director of the Center for Security Cooperation within the MND's Office for International Military Cooperation. The two delegations discussed the increasing importance of peacekeeping and stability operations throughout the world, the UN's standards for peacekeeping operations, and the training of peacekeepers.

During this current academic year, PKSOI has directed an Integrated Research Project (IRP) with ten USAWC students focused on *Translating Strategic Direction into Operational Planning and Execution for Stability*. The project examines the best approach for generating well-informed advice and policy options for national leaders, and thence translates their guidance into effective plans and actions drawing upon the strengths of the USG interagency. The research will result in an edited volume to be rolled out at PKSOI's annual AUSA event in September 2017.

Another research initiative from OSD and the Army staff is for PKSOI to investigate "right sizing for stability." The project deliverable is a planning tool tailored for complex contingency operations to assist national command authorities on the size and composition of combat and support forces to be deployed across a range of battlespaces.



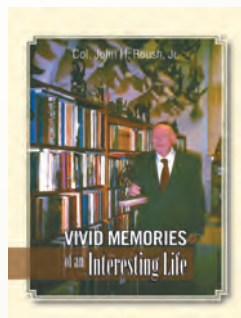
PKSOI continues supporting Global Combatant Command level exercises throughout the year with our interagency senior advisors assigned to the institute and SMEs from each of our three divisions.

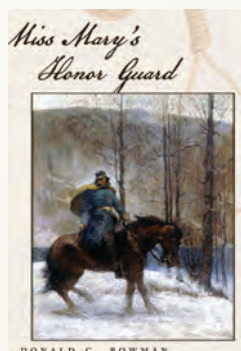

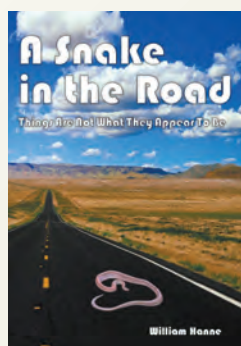
Vivid Memories of an Interesting Life by COL (Ret) John H. Rousch, Jr., DCS '70. This is a dramatic collection of significant combat experiences of 79 men in WWII, as told from one combat veteran to another. In the 86 chapters are stories involving all the various branches of combat service and all of the various theaters of war. This is neither a history book nor an attempt to tell the big picture of grand campaigns. Instead, it is a collection of personal involvements in one-at-a-time incidents of conflict. Encounters of

warfare remain a stark reality within the present era. That being so, we should read the recollections and most vivid memories of men involved in the most overpowering conflict of modern warfare.



Miss Mary's Honor Guard by LTC (Ret) Donald C. Bowman, DCS '77. A Confederate cavalry officer valiantly rescues his sweetheart, Mary, when she is snared by the Union Army and charged with espionage. While she navigates her way to safety, the officer strikes deep into Union territory with Morgan's cavalry. This exciting and emotional story, set amid the violence and destruction of the Civil War, is about the special quality that makes fearsome soldiers and indestructible families. Enduring great tragedy, they learn to persevere and protect

the things that really matter, soldiering on when hope has no reason beyond one driving force -- love.



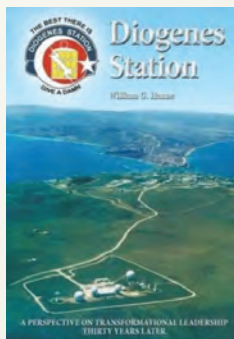
A Snake in the Road: Things are Not What They Appear to Be by COL (Ret) William G. Hanne, PhD, DCS '80. This book offers a different take on the U.S. involvement in Vietnam. After his first tour of duty in 1965-66, Hanne didn't know what to expect when he was redeployed for a second tour in 1971-72. The progress he saw in competency development and nation building in the Mekong Delta and the Seven Mountains area surprised him. So did Washington's mishandling of the potential opportunity to make a real and lasting

difference for the Vietnamese people. This book incorporates wisdom gained from nearly 30 years of experience in military intelligence and strategic analysis. It also reflects the depth of understanding from immersion in the local culture and working directly with the Vietnamese 9th ARVN Infantry Division as an advisor.



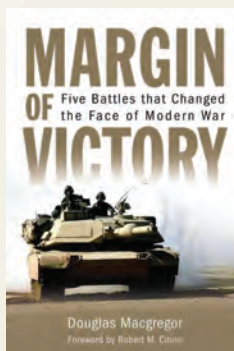
The View from First Mountain by COL (Ret) William G. Hanne, PhD, DCS '80. The Croatian War of Independence ended with the success of Operation Storm on August 7, 1995. Less than five months later, Hanne found himself part of the Democracy Transition Long Range Management Program and packing for Zagreb. Interweaving the political and historical narrative with moving personal stories of a courageous and proud people, Hanne shows the reader a country of stunning physical beauty and spiritual depth. Today, with Croatia and

the Balkans at the crossroads of Western and Middle Eastern cultures, Hanne's observations are more relevant than ever.



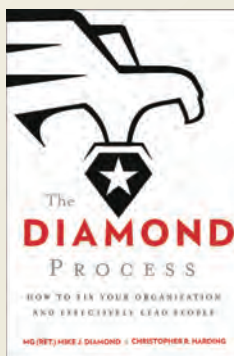
Diogenes Station: A Perspective on Transformational Leadership Thirty Years Later by COL (Ret) William G. Hanne, PhD, DCS '80. At the height of the Cold War, Hanne was selected to command Diogenes Station, an isolated, high-security, U.S. Army field station in Turkey. Being selected for a command as a colonel is an honor; being selected as commander of 500 men and women under stress is a challenge. Hanne shares the techniques of transformational leadership and "MBWA" (Management by Walking Around).

The book will also be interesting to those who served or are interested in American operations in Turkey.



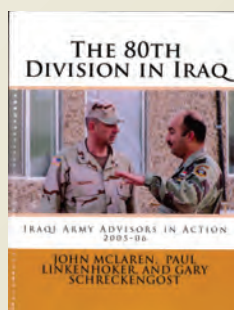
Margin of Victory: Five Battles that Changed the Face of Modern War by COL (Ret) Douglas A. Macgregor, PhD, USAWCF '96. Macgregor tells the riveting stories of five military battles of the twentieth century, each one a turning point in history. Beginning with the British Expeditionary Force holding the line at the Battle of Mons in 1914 and concluding with the Battle of Easting in 1991 during Desert Storm, this teases out a connection between these battles and teaches an important lesson about how future battles can be won. Macgregor links

each of these seemingly isolated battles thematically. He theorizes that strategy and geopolitics are ultimately more influential than ideology, and stresses that if nation-states want to be successful, they must accept the need for and the inevitability of change. The five warfighting dramas offer many lessons on the tactical, operational, and strategic levels of war.



The Diamond Process: How to Fix Your Organization and Effectively Lead People by MG (Ret) Michael J. Diamond, DCS '97, and CPT Chris Harding. Diamond combines his 45-years of experience leading troops and civilians in combat with that of his son and co-author, whose 23-years of combat and advanced education complete a wholly innovative approach to effective leadership. That will help you transform an organization and lead your team more effectively based on proven experiences and unique insights in the corporate and military worlds. The

Diamond Process should be adopted by managers and executives from government, nonprofit, financial, business and healthcare organizations, military leaders, and students—as the processes and tested strategies are universal and can be used at any level within any organization.



80th Division in Iraq: Iraqi Army Advisors in Action by MG (Ret) John P. McLaren, Jr., DDE '00, COL Paul Linkenhoker, DDE '01, and Gary Schreckengost. This is a first-hand account of three Army 80th (Blue Ridge) Division officers who were sent to Iraq in 2005-06 as Iraqi Army advisors. Then BG McLaren commanded the Iraqi Assistance Group in Baghdad; COL Linkenhoker advised the Iraqi base commander for Taji; and MAJ Schreckengost was the lead operations advisor for the Iraqi fightin' 4th Brigade, 1st Division, in Fallujah.

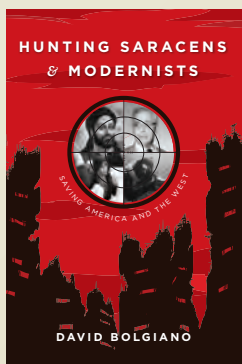


Logistics Matters and the U.S. Army in Occupied Germany, 1945-1949 by COL (Ret) L. Lee Kruger, PhD, DDE '01. This book examines the U.S. Army's presence in Germany after the Nazi regime's capitulation in May 1945. This presence required the pursuit of two stated missions: to secure German borders and to establish an occupation government within the assigned U.S. zone and sector of Berlin. Both missions required logistics support, a critical aspect often understated in existing scholarship. The security mission, covered by the combat troops, declined

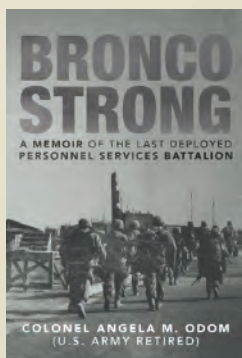
between 1945 and 1948, but grew again with the Berlin Blockade/Airlift in 1948, and then again with the Korean crisis in 1950. The logistics mission grew exponentially to support this security mission, as the U.S. Army was the only U.S. Government agency possessing the ability and resources to initially support the occupation mission in Germany.



Think: Tools to Build Your Mind by LTC Aaron A. Bazin, PhD, BSAP '07. We live in a world where we have almost limitless information at our fingertips, but what are we supposed to do with it all? The ability to think is the unique and special gift bestowed upon every individual, and this book is fundamentally about how to think, not what to think. Based on more than a decade of research, this book provides the tools with step-by-step instructions, detailed case studies, and illustrations to help you make your thinking the best it can possibly be.



Hunting Saracens and Modernists: Saving America and the West by LtCol (Ret) David Bolgiano ANG, RES '09. Bolgiano writes that the Judeo-Christian West is under siege on two major fronts: radical Islam and radical Progressivism. Depending on the degree of resistance, radical Islamists have killed or persecuted non-Muslims for the past 1,400 years. Radical Progressivism, a much newer threat, began as Marxism and is perpetuated today by those who believe that it will work if we only try harder. In this book, Bolgiano entreats Americans to return to the solution as envisioned by our Founding Fathers.

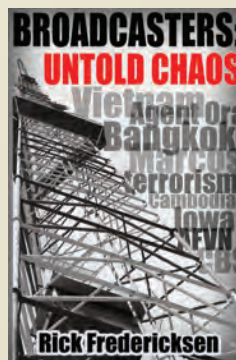

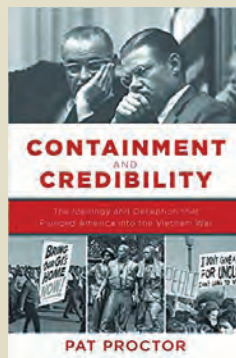

Portrayed in the movie "Good Morning, Vietnam," the real AFVN was much more controversial and dangerous. One of its TV stations was overrun during the Tet Offensive, there were numerous casualties and even a Congressional investigation into the news operation triggered by a live on-air protest. *In digital formats only.*



Containment and Credibility: The Ideology and Deception That Plunged America into the Vietnam War by COL Patrick Proctor, RES '17. As we consider how best to confront the growing threat of ISIS, it is increasingly important for the public to understand how we were convinced to go to war in the past. On the eve of the fiftieth anniversary of the Vietnam War, providing historical context that highlights how the decision to use force is made as well as how it is "sold" is important. Proctor explores how the half-truths and outright lies of both the Johnson and Nixon administrations brought us into a conflict that cost more than 50,000 American lives over eight years. This book applies the lessons of the sixties to today's similar debates regarding military involvement.

U.S. ARMY WAR COLLEGE FELLOWS UPDATE

The USAWC Fellows and CSA Senior Army Fellows – representing the Army in 53 programs worldwide – are preparing now for their next assignments having successfully enhanced their critical thinking skills, academic expertise, and professional networks at universities, think tanks, government agencies, and with industry.

The 80 USAWC Fellows in the AY 2017 cohort have taken prime advantage of learning environments that are uniquely different from those traditionally offered by the Resident or Distance programs. While negotiating tailored individual learning plans and gaining knowledge for the betterment of the Army and wider national security environment, they have also represented the Army, either

formally or informally, at their hosting institutions and surrounding areas. Their Fellowships have been configured to satisfy the Army's goal of developing appropriately-educated ambassadors for the Army who will hold positions of broad scope and great responsibility, work in highly complex, ambiguous environments, and deal with open-ended problems.

The 12 CSA Senior Army Fellows were placed by the Army's Chief to be seasoned ambassadors to centers of thought and influence, and have spent this year assisting those who deliberate on the larger security challenges faced by the nation. They also reported their findings to the senior Army leadership and individually-assigned senior mentors at salient points during the year.

CENTER FOR STRATEGIC LEADERSHIP (CSL)

CLIMATE'S IMPACT ON NATIONAL SECURITY CONFERENCE

The USAWC and the Institute on Science for Global Policy co-hosted the Climate's Impact on National Security (CINS) Conference November 28-December 1, 2016. This important event took place at the Center for Strategic Leadership and was substantively supported through the Army War College Foundation.

The CINS was a unique forum, bringing together military and civilian leadership from both the science and policy development communities in order to find areas of consensus with regards to the climate's impact on national security and to explore actionable next steps.

The military members of the forum included strategic studies group members for the Commandant of the Coast Guard, the Chiefs of Staff of the Army and Air Force, and the Secretary of Defense's Office of Net Assessment. In addition, several senior retired military leaders with an urgent interest in these matters attended, including **GEN Gordon Sullivan, RES '78** and former CSA; **VADM Lee Gunn**, former Inspector General of the Navy; and **LtGen John "Glad" Castellaw**, former Deputy Commandant of the Marine Corps for Programs and Resources.

The conference's science community highlighted the effects of climate change in severe competition for water, sustainable energy sources, healthy air, and arable land for food production. Secondary consequences include extreme human migration, widespread societal instability and collapse, declining biodiversity, and pervasive infectious diseases. All of these outcomes directly affect U.S. national security priorities.

Conference attendees agreed that the unanticipated rapidity with which climates have been observed to be changing is already having significant negative impacts on U.S. military missions. Historical and modeling data clearly demonstrate that climatic conditions are expected to worsen. However, since oftentimes these predictions consistently underestimate how bad it could be, the climate change issues are of immediate concern and merit long-term consideration.

Conference attendees also agreed that to discount or underestimate the potentially dominant impact of climate as a major organizing principle for formulation and implementation of national security policies and missions would be an error of enormous consequence. In fact, the 2015 National Security Strategy already describes climate change as one of the top strategic risks to our national interests. The

ever-expanding domestic and international responsibilities for national security borne by the U.S. military mean that changing climate conditions must remain factors in decisions made by military senior leadership. Such decisions range from installation readiness to force protection to military force structure and capabilities.

Rarely does the nation have the opportunity to be proactive about looming crises such as those being driven by climate changes. The CINS attendees recognized the serious, sustained consequences of denying, or underestimating, the broad impact of changing climates. The conference produced papers and actionable next steps for senior decision makers and recommended discrete ways in which climate impact be incorporated as an integral part of essentially all major national security decisions, especially those facing the U.S. military. To do otherwise jeopardizes U.S. economic prosperity, societal stability, and certainly, national security.



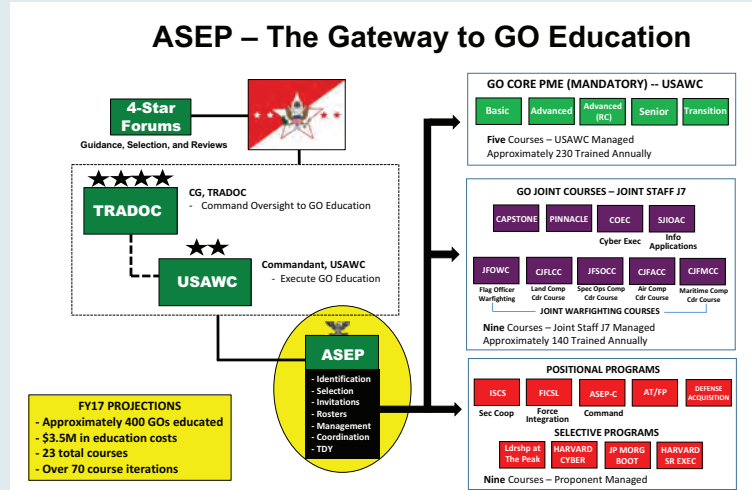
A particularly touching moment of the conference came on the first night of the conference prior to the presentation by Amb. Thomas Pickering. The Honorable Sherri Goodman, former Deputy Undersecretary of Defense for Environmental Security, led a tribute to the late **Dr. Kent Butts, DCS '92 & former FAC**, for his foundational work on environmental security issues while a member of the USAWC faculty. Ms. Goodman noted that Kent's impact was felt in every combatant command, establishing him as the authority *par excellence* over the kinds of issues that had led to this particular forum. His passing was far too early, but his work will serve as a legacy deserving of emulation. Dr. Butts was a USAWC Distinguished Fellow and former member of the Strategic Studies Institute (SSI) and the Center for Strategic Leadership (CSL).

ARMY STRATEGIC EDUCATION PROGRAM: GATEWAY TO GENERAL OFFICER EDUCATION

When the Chief of Staff of the Army placed general officer (GO) education under the U.S. Army War College (USAWC), he established a new office to manage the formal GO education strategy – the Army Strategic Education Program (ASEP) Office. ASEP manages the revised spectrum of GO courses, applying the College's experience in strategic education methods and assessments to help ensure the value of GO courses to the individuals and the Army.



The transition to today's GO education dates to 1986 when the Goldwater-Nichols Reorganization Act mandated the "Capstone" course for newly promoted active component Brigadier Generals (and their equivalent from all services). In 1999, GEN Eric Shinseki, the 34th Chief of Staff of the Army, initiated a series of formal courses and, since then, the Army's arsenal of GO courses expanded to more than 30 courses.

ASEP was envisioned to create coherence across the strategic education spectrum, ensure rigor and strategic perspective, and include GOs of all components (Active, Reserve, and National Guard). As of March 2017, ASEP serves as the gateway to a comprehensive GO education program, educating approximately 400 general officers annually. Characterized by small group dynamics, case studies and vignettes, and interaction with leaders of industry, government, education and the military, GO education is strategic in terms of career development and course content.

A primary objective for ASEP is to prepare GOs for the tremendous burden of leading an increasingly complex defense enterprise. The ASEP model attempts to put the right officer in the right course at

the right time, reducing redundancies across course offerings while making a GO's educational requirements more predictable and better aligned with career requirements. As to course content, the Army War College is at the center of the core curriculum as envisioned by GEN David Perkins, TRADOC, and **MG Bill Rapp**. Course refinement, piloted in recent years, resulted in a progressive education model that now allows ASEP and the General Officer Management Office to tailor education needs to the requirements and responsibilities for generals at specific grades.

Under the guidance of **COL Chris Beckert**, the Center for Strategic Leadership (CSL) manages the ASEP core courses. ASEP-Basic, ASEP-Advanced, and ASEP-Senior are mandatory and linked to confirmation or promotion at the Brigadier General, Major General, and Lieutenant General level, respectively. ASEP-Transition addresses information critical for post-retirement careers.

Army GOs are required, as well, to attend courses in the Joint Professional Military Education spectrum to complement Army GO education, providing a stricter focus on responsibilities when operating as part of a joint team – among them, the Combined/Joint Forces Land Component Commander Course offered by CSL. While the courses are managed by the Joint Staff, officer identification, selection, and rostering occurs through ASEP in close collaboration with GOMO and guidance from the Chief of Staff.

The complex world of today requires that the Army train and educate for uncertainty. The changes in GO education will provide GOs the requisite skills and perspectives necessary to lead the Army enterprise through ambiguous and unpredictable circumstances, while simultaneously protecting and leading Soldiers and their families. The efforts to transform GO education and establish ASEP as the education management office for strategic, uniformed leaders represents a revolution of ideas that will benefit the officers as they pursue their careers. The addition of this mission for the USAWC reinforces its role in developing strategic mindedness and strategic leaders for the Army, an imperative as the Army confronts increasingly complex Army enterprise and global security challenges.

MBTI PRESENTATION

One of the most popular presentations to students and families at the War College is the Myers-Briggs Type Indicator (MBTI) presentation. When you understand personality preferences, you can more readily appreciate differences between you and people closest to you in your life such as partners, children, and friends. In most areas of life, when differences between you and another person bother you, you avoid the other person in some way, but when that person is a family member or close friend, you have a lot to lose by walking away.



Hile Rutledge, President and Principal Consultant at OKA Associates, uses his expertise in behavior and his knowledge of MBTI types to encourage us to see those differences as just those—different ways of seeing things. Instead of labeling a person and putting value judgments on his or her behavior, you can learn to see that behavior as reflecting personality type, not something designed to offend you. Military

family lifestyles require the harmonious melding of all members of the family, and when they understand MBTI type, they are less likely to assume they are “right” and others are “wrong.” This is true across many issues including management of time, schoolwork, decision making, family recreational activities and vacations, or rules of the household.

Hile is also highly effective leading FLAGS (Facilitating Leadership and Group Skills Program) facilitator training. He uses group participation and exercises very successfully to broaden the volunteers' perspectives on the stages of group development and guiding varied individuals to a common goal. Hile's presentation provided valuable tools for the facilitators to use as they move forward to present the FLAGS programs to their peers.

DRESS FOR SUCCESS

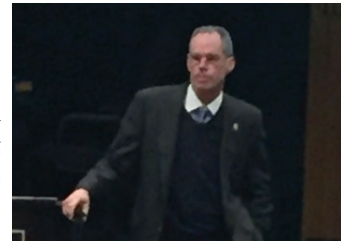

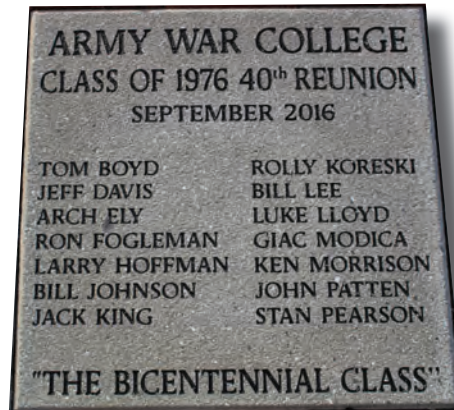

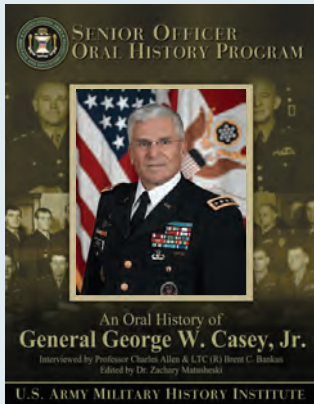

Senior Officer Oral History Program Update



Among the USAHEC's services provided to patrons is the U.S. Military History Institute's (MHI) Oral History Program. Instituted in 1970 by then Chief of Staff of the Army General William Westmoreland, the Senior Officer Oral History Program (SOOHP) focus is on former Army Chiefs of Staff, Vice Chiefs, Combatant Commanders, and principal staff officers, i.e. G-3, G-4, etc. Being biographical in nature, the SOOHP

investigates the officer's career from life prior to entering the military to the present, exploring how life's experiences shaped their career.

MHI has expanded its coverage with deployed commander experiences to include Iraq and Afghanistan, as well as selected position interviews, e.g. **BG (Ret) Stanley Cherrie, RES '85** as G-3 for VII Corps during the Gulf War.

Base questions come from the Center of Military History and the interviewee's biographical summary, supplemented by questions solicited from those who served with the individual. Currently, interviews are conducted by the MHI Chief, Oral History Branch, and volunteer faculty who may have served with the individual being interviewed.

Also, per Army Regulation 870-5, *Military History: Responsibilities, Policies and Procedures*, MHI is responsible for conducting the Division Commander Lessons Learned or DCLL program. Established to assist incoming division commanders, the program initiates contact with the outgoing commander several months prior to the change of command. The program is focused on exploring lessons learned in areas ranging from training, resources, garrison operations, deployments, and giving the commander a “read ahead” on what to expect upon assuming command. Unlike SOOHP interviews, the DCLL oral histories are for incumbent division commanders and are not open to the general public.

ARMY WAR COLLEGE FOUNDATION DEVELOPMENT UPDATE

OUR FIRST REAL ESTATE DONATION

We have been approached by a donor wishing to use a powerful tool the IRS offers to taxpayers – the donation of appreciated property to a non-profit 501(c)3 organization, in this case our Foundation. The donor bought an end-unit townhouse very early in his military career, and kept the property as a rental as he moved from post to post. He recently chose to streamline his investment holdings and realized he was in a position to owe significant capital gains taxes when he sold the townhouse. Additionally, he faced the prospect of preparing and marketing the property for sale from out of state. Instead, our team is now in the process of preparing to receive the townhouse and put the proceeds to work for our Foundation to help the College. The donor has received an appraisal and we have received the results of a property inspection. We will soon complete the transaction and receive title to the property while the donor will be able to claim a deduction for the full market value of the property on his taxes, while also avoiding the payment of capital gains taxes. In a further step of generosity, the donor has offered to make donations to us to cover monthly utility bills until we are able to sell the property!



If you are facing a sizable capital gains tax bill on appreciated property, stocks, or mutual funds, donating the property to us is one way of avoiding those taxes (and for real estate, avoiding the sales process). If you are not in a position to donate the property outright, perhaps we can arrange for you to receive recurring income as well as a partial tax deduction. 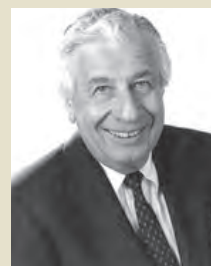

OTHER WAYS TO GIVE — LIFE INSURANCE

In addition to providing protection for family members or business associates, life insurance also offers a route for planned giving to the Foundation. When a life insurance policy has outlived its original purpose, consider changing the policy to name the Foundation as a beneficiary. If you still need the policy’s protection, most life insurance policies allow the policy owner to name the Foundation a *successor beneficiary* – a party to receive the life insurance policy proceeds if the original beneficiary is also deceased when the policy claim is filed. If you would like to claim a charitable deduction on your taxes, you may irrevocably assign the policy to the Foundation as owner of the policy. You would no longer retain the right to make changes to the policy or to name beneficiaries, but you could deduct the smaller of 1) policy fair-market value or 2) the net premiums paid to-date. You could also receive continuing tax deductions by donating the amount of the policy premium to the Foundation each year.

A LEGACY OF GENEROSITY

Our Foundation lost a wonderful and generous friend, Mr. Jack Rudin of New York City, on December 4, 2016 when he died at age 92. Mr. Rudin is responsible for funding the **USAWC Landpower Essay Program**, now referred to as the Elihu Root Prize, for the best articles published in *Parameters* from authors across the U.S. and international security community. Mr. Rudin was Chairman of Rudin Management Company, one of New York City’s leading real estate builders and owners, and he was a most dedicated and generous philanthropist. He never forgot his military service, expressing great pride for having enlisted in the U.S. Army



in 1942 and serving as a member of the 89th Infantry Division under GEN George S. Patton.

Thanks to Mr. Jack Rudin for helping advance the study of Strategic Landpower.

Former Commandant Passes Away
LTG (Ret) Richard D. Lawrence,
PhD, RES '71 & Cmdt '82-'83
July 31, 1930 – December 9, 2016

LTG (Ret) Lawrence was born in Eastland, Texas, graduated from high school in Houston, and then from West Point in 1953. He got his Masters in Engineering at USC and his Doctorate in Operations Research at Ohio State. He commanded the 1st Squadron, 1st Cavalry Regiment in Vietnam from 1968 to 1969 and was awarded two Silver Stars. He became a Brookings Institute Fellow and published *U.S. Force Structure in NATO*. He was part of the design team for the Abrams M-1 tank and then commanded the 1st Brigade, 1st Cavalry Division at Fort Hood. He was then selected as the Project Manager for modernizing the

Saudi Arabian National Guard and promoted to BG. He learned Arabic and was recognized as an expert in Middle East affairs. He returned to Washington, D.C. to lead the Army Tank Management Office in the Pentagon as a MG. During that time, he was selected by President Carter and Cyrus Vance to be the Senior U.S. Military Advisor to the Camp David Accords, working closely with senior military officials from Israel and Egypt negotiating the locations of the Israeli withdrawal phases from the Sinai. He was selected as the 1st Cavalry Division Commander at Fort Hood in 1980, then Commandant of the Army War College, and finally as President of the National Defense University. During his career, he was an advisor to three Presidents - Ford, Carter, and Reagan, and was a member of the Council on Foreign Relations. He retired in 1986 and eventually moved to Austin where he was a UT professor working on the Advanced Electromagnetic Railgun. He became an accomplished portrait sculptor at age 65. He is survived by Patsy and a loving family.

MG Francisco A. Espailat, RES '07 & SRCOC '16

December 17, 1960-April 7, 2017

On March 14th in Oviedo, Florida, **LTG Charles Luckey, DDE '01**, CG of the U.S. Army Reserve Command, sadly welcomed all of us in attendance to honor the life of Francisco Espailat, a great American, friend, and fellow USAWC alumnus. Just two weeks earlier, LTG Luckey had promoted him to MG and congratulated him on selection to serve as the Chief of Staff for the U.S. Army Reserve Command. LTG Luckey described MG Espailat as "a splendid soldier who embodied leadership, energy, and a relentless spirit of execution in everything he did." Those words ring true to all those who knew and served with him. He stood tall at 6'4" with a strong commanding presence, yet it was his bright smile, warm personality, and devotion to those with whom he served that drew people to love and respect him.

Only those who knew his personal story truly understood the challenges he overcame to have such success in the U.S. Army. At the memorial service, Dr. Homer Ooten, Assistant Vice President for Florida State University (FSU), shared some of that story and it is worthy to pass on as an inspiration to us all.



MG Espailat was born in New York City to a single mother and never knew his biological father. As a young boy, he moved to his mother's native Dominican Republic, but by the age of 14, he only had an elementary school education. Tall and infatuated with the game of basketball, he closely followed the local team and eventually became their interpreter since he was bilingual in English and Spanish. In 1976, a visiting basketball team from FSU changed the course of his life. Dr. Ooten accompanied the FSU team to Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic, and met Francisco for the first time. When one of the FSU team's entourage learned that Francisco had not attended school since he'd moved to Santo Domingo, an offer was made that if Francisco could make it to Tallahassee, they would help him get his education. MG Espailat's mother gathered up enough money for a one-way ticket to Tallahassee and with a great step of faith, sent him on a journey that would lead to greatness.

Dr. Ooten ultimately took Francisco into his home and raised him alongside his own children. Francisco worked tirelessly to overcome his serious academic challenges while becoming a talented Lincoln High School basketball player, honored as the team's Most Valuable Player as a senior. Francisco was also proud of being a Boy Scout and becoming an Eagle Scout. He went on to play basketball for Georgia Military College where he graduated in 1982, earning an Army commission into the Quartermaster Corps, and where he was recently honored as a 2015 Distinguished Alumnus.

On April 7th at only 56 years of age, MG Espailat collapsed while doing physical fitness training on post at Fort Bragg, NC, and could not be revived. He leaves behind a wonderful family: his wife, Margaret, and their three sons, Richard, Frank, and Miles.

COL (Ret) Jarrold M. Reeves, Jr., RES '03

May 25, 1959-November 12, 2016

COL (Ret) Jarrold M. 'Jerry' Reeves, Jr., 57, was killed on November 12, 2016 by a suicide bomber at Bagram Air Base, Afghanistan.

Jarrold graduated from Presbyterian College in Clinton, SC in 1982 with a B.S. in Business Administration and was commissioned from ROTC in the Quartermaster Corps. He retired from the Army in May 2011 at Fort Knox as Deputy Commander, 3rd Sustainment Command (Expeditionary) [formerly 3rd COSCOM] (2007-2011). Other senior leadership positions included: Commander, 553rd Corps Support Battalion at Fort Hood, TX (1999-2001); Deputy Chief of Staff, G-4 (Logistics), 4th Infantry Division at Fort Hood (2001-2002); Deputy Chief of Staff, G-3 (Operations), 21st Theater Support Command at Kaiserslautern, Germany (2003-2004); and Commander, 200th Materiel Management Center (Theater

Distribution Brigade) at Kaiserslautern (2004- 2007). As a talented logistician and effective leader, he was most proud of his deployment to Iraq in 2008 to oversee the sustainment and distribution of logistics support and to lead the initial planning and execution for the drawdown of military forces and associated equipment. He also was proud of his deployment to Haiti in 2010 to lead the initial planning for Humanitarian Assistance and Disaster Relief support to over a million Haitians affected by an earthquake. After retiring from the Army, he continued serving his country by joining Fluor Corporation in July 2011 and deploying to Afghanistan to provide logistics services for military forces. Jarrold was Fluor's Deputy Project Manager for Logistics and Public Works in Afghanistan at the time of his death. He died doing what he loved -- providing for the U.S. Military Soldier.

COL Reeves' name will be added to the USAWC Alumni Memorial for graduates killed in hostile action. The Class of 2003 will be notified when the ceremony date is determined in coordination with Jarrold's widow, Katrina, and his family.

COL (Ret) Robert C. 'Bobby' Bacon, RES '73

December 14, 1933-March 6, 2017

In 1964, then CPT 'Bobby' Bacon was leading South Vietnamese troops through the Mekong Delta in the early days of America's involvement in the Vietnam War. Bacon was one of 100 American officers handpicked to serve as advisers to the South Vietnamese Army, with the dual purpose of leading troops against Viet Cong insurgents and assessing their ability to fight and win. The advisers were the leading edge of America's protracted involvement in this complicated and controversial war. As Bacon led the men through a tall grassy field, famed English war photographer Larry Burrow snapped this image which ended up on the cover of *Life* magazine.

COL (Ret) Bacon died at age 83, the son of another USAWC graduate, **COL Robert Lynn Bacon, RES '40**, who died in 1967. Following two tours in Vietnam, Bacon served as protocol officer for Army Chiefs of Staff GEN William Westmoreland and GEN Harold K. Johnson. Under Johnson, Bacon helped plan the funeral of U.S. Sen. Robert Kennedy, and under Westmoreland, helped plan the funeral of former President Dwight D. Eisenhower. But aside from his contributions at the highest levels of the military, one of Bacon's most lasting achievements occurred at

Fort Jackson. From January 1976 to July 1977, as commander of Fort Jackson's 2nd Infantry Brigade, he guided a pilot program to test training male and female recruits together. "It was kind of interesting," Bacon told the Fort Jackson Leader in 2011. "There were pros and cons. All the women were high school graduates when they came in, and (a lot of) the guys were Category 4s (without high school diploma). You'd have things like assembly and disassembly of a rifle ... verbal tests and things like that - we had all the women acing these tests, and (some of) the guys just weren't equipped to get it all". After retiring from the Army, Bacon worked for the U.N. Peacekeeping Task Force in Israel and Egypt, and as a military consultant in Saudi Arabia, Turkey, and the Sinai Peninsula. He loved spending time with his wife Sun and watching his grandchildren. He was also very proud of the fact that Army beat Navy this year in football!

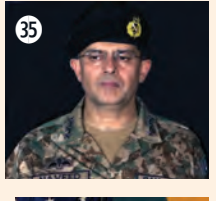

OUR ORGANIZATION'S 50-YEAR HISTORY!

The establishment of the Alumni Association of the U.S. Army War College in May 1967 coincided with the moving of the U.S. Army College into the current Root Hall. From 1951, when the College moved to Carlisle Barracks, until April 1967, the College had operated its library, auditorium, and faculty offices from the "old" Root Hall, which is now Upton Hall. Student committee rooms and student work spaces were provided in a converted stables which was the "old" Bliss Hall.

The "new" Root Hall dedication ceremony was held on April 29, 1967. Remarks at the ceremony were made by the Honorable George

N. Wade, State Senator, 31st District of Pennsylvania; LTG William E. Train, Commanding General of 1st U.S. Army at Ft. Meade (and former USAWC Commandant from 1962-1964 when much of the planning for Root Hall was completed); and MG Eugene A. Salet, serving Commandant at the time. The dedication address was given by MG (Ret) Ulysses S. Grant III, grandson of President Grant and son-in-law of Elihu Root, having married Edith Root in 1907.

The official "birthday" of the Alumni Association, the oldest part of our Foundation, is May 19, 1967. We are proud of our 50 years of service to the College and its graduates, and look forward to countless more!
