- Purpose: This memorandum establishes the award and provides the requirements, policy guidance, and procedures for the recognition of U.S. Army War College graduates as "Outstanding Alum, U.S. Army War College."
- **General:** This program is managed by the Army War College Foundation, Inc. The "Outstanding Alum Award" is established to provide a prestigious and visible means of honoring U.S. Army War College graduates who distinguished themselves through outstanding achievement to their community or country.
- Eligibility: To be eligible for designation as "Outstanding Alum, U.S. Army War College," individuals must:
- 1. Be listed in the Directory of U.S. Army War College Graduates as a "graduate."
- 2. Be retired for a minimum of one year from the government service that was the source of attendance at the U.S. Army War College.
- 3. Have made significant and lasting contributions through continued service to their community or country since the above mentioned retirement.

Nomination and Selection Procedure:

- 1. Any U.S. Army War College Foundation member in good standing may nominate any U.S. Army War College graduate for designation as an "Outstanding Alum, U.S. Army War College." Nominations will be submitted in writing and will contain documentation of the individual's contributions and justification as to why the individual should be so honored. Nominations should be addressed to the Army War College Foundation, and mailed to 122 Forbes Ave., Carlisle, PA 17013-5248. Nominations may also be sent via email to alumni@usawc.org with appropriate attachments.
- 2. Nominations will be forwarded to the Alumni Affairs Committee of the Army War College Foundation Board of Trustees in person or via email. The Alumni Affairs Committee will review the nominations and make recommendations to the full Board of Trustees for final action.

Notification:

- 1. Individuals approved for designation as "Outstanding Alum, U.S. Army War College" will be notified of their selection by official correspondence from the President of the Board.
- 2. The CEO of the Foundation will schedule an appropriate ceremony.
- 3. The Foundation will reimburse the recipient for round-trip travel expenses incurred from place of residence to Carlisle or other approved location for receipt of the award. Lodging and meal costs incurred during the travel are not reimbursable. However, meal costs at the award event for the awardee and one guest will be paid by the Foundation.

- 4. Privileges and Responsibilities: The designation "Outstanding Alum, U.S. Army War College" is primarily honorific and involves no increases in retirement annuity or other remuneration. Recognition of outstanding status includes:
- Invitations to special Foundation and Alumni Affairs events.
- b. Featured in a separate article of the Foundation and Alumni News.
- Notification to local newspapers of the selection for the award.
- d. Name and photo included in the Outstanding Alum digital display in Root Hall at the College.
- e. Presented with a certificate attesting to selection for this honor.
- f. An individual designated as "Outstanding Alum, U.S. Army War College" is authorized to use the title and privileges indefinitely.
- 5. Revocation: The title and privileges may be revoked upon recommendation of the Board of Trustees and approval of the President of the Board for conduct or actions no longer reflecting the high standards of integrity and ethical conduct appropriate for an outstanding, retired, graduate of the U.S. Army War College.

Each of these events had approximately 25,000 to 40,000 persons in attendance. His Philmont and National Scout Jamboree contributions alone have impacted hundreds of thousands of youth and adults. THOMAS L. PRATHER, JR. Major General, U. S. Army Retired POST ACTIVE-DUTY Military SERVICE ACTIVITIES

Major General Prather continues to support active and retired military service members and their families as he did during his more than 33 years of active service. He has a passion for identifying the numerous needs, challenges and solutions for military families associated with the mission of maintaining Total Army Readiness. He supports the Army community and the local community at large through his church and community activities and, particularly, the Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC) program at his alma mater, Morgan State University.

General Prather has been and is a staunch supporter of the ROTC Program at Morgan State University. By way of background, the Morgan State ROTC program has a proud tradition of graduating top quality officers for the U. S. Army since 1948. More than 1,415 cadets have commissioned over the life of the program, and eleven (11) have become general officers including two (2) four stars; two (2) three stars; four (4) two stars and three (3) one stars.

In 1989, while still on active duty, General Prather became personally involved with Morgan's ROTC program by joining Morgan State University's ROTC Alumni Association. He was a prominent member of the committee that orchestrated and managed the establishment of the ROTC Alumni Chapter By-Laws and Constitution thereby creating sound business policies and procedures to govern chapter operations. As a Life-Time member, he participates in the association's assistance to The Professor of Military Science (PMS) in the areas of recruitment, training and mentoring. The association, in conjunction with the university's Endowment Committee, assures the availability of \$2,500 per semester, maximum, for the PMS to recognize selected cadets with demonstrated exemplary performances during the period. He chairs the board that reviews the PMS' award recommendations prior to submission and approval by the Endowment Committee. General Prather was one of the founders of the university's Mentorship Program in which cadets are assigned an ROTC alumni mentor. That mentor follows his or her cadet(mentee) throughout the ROTC experience providing advice and assistance as required. The program's success can be measured by the large number of mentors who maintain contact with cadets after commissioning.

In addition to the ROTC Alumni Association, he is a member of Morgan State University's ROTC Enhancement Team; joining at its inception in 1994 and serving as Chairman since July 2005. The Enhancement Team is the advisory board for the program and consists of 23 former Morgan ROTC graduates. The team interfaces with Headquarters, Department of the Army and the U. S. Army Cadet Command on critical issues involving staffing, uniform and equipment shortages and with the university on matters pertaining to academic and program support.

Significant highlights of General Prather's involvement with the ROTC Alumni Association and the Enhancement Team have been: (1) the implementation of a Room and Board Grant Program; (2) ROTC Program recognition by the President and other key university officials; (3) uniforms for all cadets throughout the program and (4) competent ROTC staffing.

He leads the team of general officers, all Morgan State ROTC graduates, who advise and make recommendations to the university president on the best qualified candidate for the PMS position from nominations submitted by The U. S. Army Cadet Command. This PMS selection process ensures that the best qualified officer is selected for the program. The process was implemented for the last two (2) officers assigned to the position and their performances resulted in resounding program successes, to include higher recruitment and sustained enrollment. Prior selections to this process did not consistently produce desired results. ROTC is the institution from which the Army receives the majority of its officers.

General Prather's emphasis on mission accomplishment is vital to ensure the viability of ROTC programs such as that at Morgan State University. He spends numerous hours on the highways between Virginia and Baltimore (Morgan State) to attend meetings, awards, graduation and commissioning ceremonies, and other activities involving the ROTC program.

General Prather is a Life-Time member of The Rocks, a mentoring organization, and supports that organization's members and ROTC cadet mentorship and scholarship programs which enhance the total military experience for all. The organization is unrelenting in its efforts to ensure those serving in the military have the requisite tools for success.

Since 1996, he has been a member of Christ United Methodist Church, Fairfax Station, VA. At Christ Church, he has served in a number of significant positions including the Trustee and Usher Boards and is currently a Communion Steward. He mentors seminary students and provides the basic information necessary to understand leadership in the church's programs. He assists the pastors and congregation as a whole in understanding the importance of the church's Wounded Warrior/Soldier Program to the community. Additionally, he is a faithful supporter of the Rising Hope Mission Church of Alexandria, Virginia. Rising Hope provides meals, shelter and other critical needs for the Homeless along the Route 1 corridor of Northern Virginia.

In his community of over 1400 homes, General Prather attends all meetings in which homeowner concerns are aired and acted upon. These meetings reinforce the high standards outlined by the Homeowner's Association guidelines and assures that the community maintains its standing as one of the most viable homesteads in Northern Virginia. He brings to the community lessons learned from experiences living throughout the world during his 33-year career.
