The resources devoted to our new facility provide for innovative learning spaces that genuinely set it apart and underscore our vision for the College's future. With 24 seminar rooms and many other spaces tailored for interactive and collaborative learning, it is clear that Root Hall is dedicated to student excellence. Empowered by our world-class faculty and staff, this inspirational educational environment will enable the rich and productive discussions and exploration of deeper insights that are so necessary for shaping thought leadership.

During this last busy year of construction, both our resident and non-resident programs have achieved noteworthy milestones. With over 720 students graduating this year from those two programs our influence in molding the future of defense leadership remains evident. Every school, center, institute, and program across the College has been achieving amazing results with their individual and group research, conferences, and leadership engagements that continually shape the global defense perspectives and capabilities. You'll read about many of them in this magazine and in the multiple communications that are linked to the U.S. Army War College homepage and to War Room, Decisive Point, and so many great and informative sites.

We are also helping confront immediate challenges, such as the nation's recruitment challenge. This year's National Seminar tackled "Building Tomorrow's Army," which wasn't just a theme; it was a mission. That seminar and the Commandant's National Security Program brought over 220 influencers to the College from a cross-section of society and all regions of the country. These two College programs are among the dozens that interface internally and externally to create a vibrant hub for exchanging ideas and fostering collaboration, then spreading knowledge into new communities about military contributions to society. We delved deep into actionable strategies with programs like the International Security Crisis Negotiation Exercise and the Eisenhower Series College Program, both conducted at colleges and universities across the U.S. Most notably this year, we created the Civil-Military Relations Center and sponsored our first conference with the theme, "Military and Society: The All-Volunteer Force Turns 50."

As USAWC graduates with profound understanding of collective sacrifice and consequence, your role in the nation's future is indispensable. The College's role in preparation of future senior leaders to tackle the uncertainties of the future is also clear and compelling, so every decision, every program, and every initiative is geared towards this goal of preparing leaders for tomorrow.

As I reflect on my tenure as your 53rd Commandant, I am struck by the dedication, passion, and commitment I see around me every day and it reinforces to me that we are shaping the future. The College's history is rich and storied in how it has prepared future leaders for over 120 years to see challenges, face adversities, and emerge stronger to elevate the security of our nation and those of our Allies. Dr. Breckenridge's great sense of humor and positive approach were bonuses throughout his tenure as he applied his extensive expertise integrating academic resources across the College. He always had the strategic view when it came to unscrambling complexities and then re-scrambling them to achieve focus and excel where needed. He deserves tremendous credit for the open and flexible design of the new academic building. Jim and his wife Missy (also Dr. Breckenridge) were incredible members of the USAWC community and they will be greatly missed.



Message from the New Provost

I am excited to start work as the third Provost of the College. A special note of thanks to all the staff, faculty, and students that I have worked with over all these years. You make this a great place to learn, live, and work.

This will be a memorable year. We are changing out many of our senior leaders, standing up a center for the study of Chinese landpower, updating programs, going through Joint Staff certification of our senior service college curricula, and occupying a new academic facility. These transitions provide the USAWC an opportunity to introspectively examine what we do and how we do it, helping us become an institution of choice.

The Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, General Mark Milley, recently wrote an article in which he asserts that our nation is at a strategic inflection point while witnessing an unprecedented fundamental change in the character of war. Regional conflicts in Europe and the Nagorno-Karabakh region illustrate this change. The USAWC must continue to

explore new ways to educate strategic leaders and conduct impactful research that is of value to the Army and Joint Force if we are to keep pace with the ever-changing international security environment.

The USAWC is a remarkable institution which provides a unique set of capabilities to our nation. We are continuing to refine options for delivering assessment-informed tailorable education for our students while also examining how we can better coordinate the various research capabilities across the College. The school, centers, institutes, and programs of the USAWC are uniquely poised to explore strategic issues from the lens of past, present, and future.

I do have a few goals as Provost. The first is to get us thinking of USAWC as a campus. The move to our new academic facility located next to our Center for Strategic Leadership provides us opportunities to rethink the use of space. This will be a significant change in mindset. In the old Root Hall, learning mainly occurred within the seminar rooms. Now, learning can start from the moment a student steps foot on the campus. A

plethora of outdoor and indoor collaborative spaces, easy access to spaces designed for classified discussions, and an innovation laboratory made possible by the Army War College Foundation all provide opportunities never seen before at Carlisle Barracks.

We are also working to ensure that the USAWC is a place where students, staff, and faculty feel safe, enjoy their jobs, and see a path for personal and professional advancement.

Finally, we have a cross-organizational working group exploring the subjects of artificial intelligence and data literacy. These emerging topics have the potential for tremendous impact on our profession.

CIVIL-MILITARY CONFERENCE

Inaugural Civil-Military Conference Addresses Army Recruiting Challenges

In the last magazine, we announced the establishment of the USAWC Civil-Military Relations Center (CMRC). Over the course of AY23, the CMRC successfully expanded the scope and scale of education and research opportunities on civil-military relations in the U.S. and across the world—programming that established the College as a national leader in bridging both the civil-military and academic-practitioner divides.

In just our first year of existence, the CMRC, established an educational area of concentration, and offered a research project for students interested in helping the Army think about its recruiting challenges. In addition, the Center hosted 12 talks by leading scholars and authors and promoted research on contemporary issues facing the nation, all while its 16 faculty affiliates published eight articles and participated in half a dozen podcasts.

In response to major recruiting challenges and calls from senior leaders, the Center's inaugural conference took place on May 5-6, 2023, with the theme, "Military and Society: The All-Volunteer Force Turns 50." The Center received over 70 paper proposals in the fall of 2022 from scholars and practitioners, and hosted over 100 scholars and practitioners in person at the Army Heritage and Education Center for this conference, with another 40 participants tuning in virtually from across the country. This resulted in a two-day program that featured plenary sessions by experts to help us trace

the past, present, and future of All-Volunteer the alongside 12 breakout panel sessions that showcased student and faculty research and writing. The conference also featured keynote fireside chats with LTG (Ret) David W. Barno, RES '95 of Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies, and Dr. Peter Feaver of Duke University.

Throughout the conference, participants presented work and research that revealed new and important thinking on the future of the U.S. military's recruiting, effectiveness, and the force's ability to respond to modern threats. Panels covered a wide range of topics, including the history of the draft to the state of the Reserves, to the future of selective service, decisions about the use of force, and the role of veterans in American society. As a result of the quality and importance of the work presented, the CMRC is partnering with Army University Press to produce a special issue of *Military Review* with highlights from the conference.

FINAL PREPARATIONS FOR CENTCOM IFCEP

The College is preparing to conduct the fourth IF Continuing Education Program (IFCEP) this fall bringing together alumni from partner nations in the Central Command Area of Responsibility. The IFCEP is designed to refresh, update, and introduce contemporary issues taught at USAWC and provide our alumni academic and professional resources to support their lifelong learning. It is a forum where participants interact and dialog on issues, expose differing national perspectives, and identify concerns in the region amongst neighbors in order to develop a collaborative community of security stakeholders.

The six-week course is divided into two phases with four areas of emphasis focused on Leadership, Policy, Doctrine, and Regional Issues. Topics in each area are introduced during Phase I in September via distance learning using readings, videos, lectures, and asynchronous discussions. Phase II, held in October, reinforces the topics during a face-to-face symposium where the alumni openly discuss each other's perspective in a non-attribution environment.

The first IFCEP was held in 2019 with nations in the central and southern Americas, with 12 grads coming together in Mexico City for the final week. The second in October 2021 involved 14 IFs who assembled in Zagreb, Croatia to focus on the European region. Most recently last November, the third IFCEP focused on INDOPACOM, uniting attendees in Bangkok, Thailand.

This year, 32 IF alums from across the Middle East have been invited to attend the IFCEP that culminates in Amman, Jordan in mid-October. Discussions are also ongoing with regional commands and organizations with interests in the region for 10 to 15 more U.S. graduates. In 2024, the College hopes to double the number of IFCEP events from one to two a year, increasing attendance while maintaining small seminars on relevant security topics. Planning for the first ever IFCEP focused in the AFRICOM area of responsibility has already begun, pending approval of the expanded educational effort. The resident phase of that event is projected in Lusaka, Zambia in April 2024. We will keep you posted on future IFCEP plans.

ADVANCED REGIONAL STUDIES (ARS) TRAVEL

EUROPE

The purpose of the AY23 Advanced Regional Studies (ARS) Europe was to deepen selected students' understanding of the U.S.' external strategic environment across the Atlantic Ocean. This Term II elective in April centered around an 11-day trip to explore the defense and security interests of and challenges for Europe through a variety of lenses and engagements in different countries. A major focus this year was the ongoing war in Ukraine and questions about strategies of victory and war termination. Another primary goal of the ARS course was to develop students' appreciation for U.S. interests in Europe and the role that values play in the transatlantic relationship. Europe's evolving relationship with the Peoples Republic of China was another important topic for discussion.

All ARS courses build on various perspectives developed in the core regional studies program. The concepts of "Strategic Empathy" and "Historical Mindedness" are essential for this process. During several pre-trip sessions, ARS Europe students in AY23 engaged in classified briefings and conducted several focus sessions on Europe's eastern, northern, southern, and western flanks.

ARS Europe traveled to Finland (Helsinki), one of the newest NATO members; Poland (Warsaw), a key NATO ally on Europe's eastern flank; and France (Paris and Bayeux), the U.S.' oldest ally in Western Europe, with significant global interests and ambitions. Major engagements in Helsinki were meetings with the Finish Ministry of Defense, the Aleksanteri Institute on Russia and Eastern Europe, the oldest European think tank that focuses on Russia, and the Finish Institute of International Affairs. Highlights in Warsaw were commemorations for the 80th anniversary of the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising in 1943, an insightful meeting with a member of the Polish Sejm, and deep discussions with students and faculty from the University of Warsaw, some of them refugees from Ukraine.

Once we arrived in France, ARS Europe first visited some of the sites of the Allied landings in Normandy during World War II. In Paris, among other engagements, ARS Europe met with the *Centre d'analyse*, *de prévision et de stratégie* at the French foreign ministry, the *Institut de Recherche Stratégique* at the French ministry of defense, and noted journalist Daphné Benoit and others from *Agence France-Presse*.

EURASIA

Eurasia ARS students traveled over 12,000 miles from April 15-29, 2023 by planes, train, and bus to cities in Türkiye, Latvia, and Lithuania with faculty members **Dr. Robert Hamilton, USAWCF '09** and **Dr. Leone Musgrave**. At the start of each country visit, each embassy provided a team brief outlining the state of security, the economy, the impact of the Russia/Ukraine war on the region, and other current and historical issues for their location.

Key engagements in Ankara, Türkiye included meetings with the NATO-accredited Center of Excellence Defense Against Terrorism, Ministry of National Defense, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Turkish Aerospace Industries, and a visit to Anıtkabir, a complex located in the Çankaya district of Ankara, which includes the mausoleum of Mustafa Kemal Atatürk. The group traveled from Ankara to Istanbul by train and spent two days visiting major cultural and historical sites such as the Basilica Cistern, the Hagia Sophia Grand Mosque, and the Dolmabahçe Palace.



Next up was a flight to Riga, Latvia where the Ministry of Defense, the National Armed Forces Joint Headquarters, the NATO Force Integration Unit, the NATO-accredited Strategic Communications Center of Excellence, and the Baltic Security Foundation all provided briefings. In Latvia, with help from the U.S. Embassy, the Eurasia ARS students organized a USAWC Alumni Social at Folkklubs Ala.

ADVANCED REGIONAL STUDIES (ARS) TRAVEL CONTINUED

The event included Latvia IF graduates Gaidis A. Zeibots, RES '99, Juris Maklakovs RES '04, and Janis Karlsbergs, DDE '07.



On the final leg of the trip, the group traveled by bus to Lithuania and met with the U.S. Belarus Affairs Section, the Ministry of National Defense, the enhanced Forward Presence NATO Force Integration Unit, the Ministry of Foreign



Affairs, Vilnius University and toured the Ninth Fort and parliament. Lithuanian IF alumni Arvydas Pocius RES '04, Almantas Leika, DDE '06, and Viktoras Bagdonas, RES '21 attended a mixer with the ARS students and faculty at the Old Green Grill House.

The highlight of the trip was on the final day when the group met with the exiled Belarusian opposition leader Sviatlana Tsikhanouskaya and her team – a formidable ending to a deeply enriching USAWC experience.

RES '97 INTERNATIONAL FELLOWS REUNION

Berlin, March 16-19, 2023

The IFs of 'The Great Class of 1997' have met regularly since 2007, with reunions in Belgium, Jordan, Norway, Qatar, Nepal, the U.S., Australia, Sweden, and now Germany. As we have become older, we have felt the need to shorten the time between reunions. However, that was not the reason why the reunion of 2023 in Berlin was held within nine months of the wonderful reunion in Stockholm in June 2022. As our loyal readers may remember, our classmate from Qatar, H.E. Sheikh Abdulla Al-Thani, offered then to host the next reunion in Berlin, where he is Ambassador for Qatar. Remembering the epic reunion that he hosted in Doha in 2013, we could not pass on this opportunity.

On Thursday, March 16th, we gathered in our splendid Marriott Berlin Hotel, where Abdulla welcomed us. Two Embassy mini-vans then whisked us to Hotel de Rome for our first dinner, hosted by diplomat Mr. Nawaf and, as usual, it took no time to feel young again, remembering our Carlisle days.



The next morning, we walked to the 'Brandenburger Tor' and witnessed an impressive ceremonial procession involving Prime Minister Netanyahu of Israel. Our highly professional guide, Tobi, showed

us many historic places, including the original line of the Berlin Wall. He also helped us to re-live a great part of history. We had all seen Checkpoint Charlie before, and our British friend had even served a couple of years in Berlin during the Cold War. Tobi was raised in East Germany, and he could impressively sketch how people there felt, including how the older generation now feels about the re-unification of Germany and attitudes towards Russia with the Ukraine situation. It was a reminder of a wise lesson that we were taught at the War College: Imagine how others think (not just opponents, but also people who live in another environment, who are less fortunate, and have had differing experiences and influences). Finally, we walked through the overwhelming Holocaust Memorial and saw where Hitler spent his last days, in a now destroyed bunker.

On the afternoon of March 17th, we walked along 'Unter den Linden,' witnessed tourists on 'Trabi-Safari' (driving in Communist East Germany's now obsolete Trabant motor cars) and visited the German Historical Museum. Here the thought-provoking exhibition 'Roads not taken' showed how

historical outcomes could have been totally different, if other decisions had been made – some with disastrous results, others pre-empting disaster. We were hosted for dinner at the Titanic Hotel by diplomat Mr. Ahmad who had picked the best place in Berlin to enjoy perfectly-cooked steaks.

We started Saturday with a short walk to the fascinating German Spy Museum, where we regretted not having brought our grandchildren since many features had been part of our lives in our younger days. We were particularly impressed by a scale model of the Glienicke Bridge, where U.S. pilot Gary Powers was exchanged for Soviet intelligence officer Rudolf Abel in 1962. We would cross this bridge ourselves the next day on our trip to Potsdam.

Abdulla then led us on a guided tour through the German Bundestag. It was a privilege to see the work of internationally renowned architect Norman Foster. The buildings weave in stunning new concepts, while retaining significant parts of the old fabric of what had once been the old Reichstag, largely burned down in 1933. The most recent building is the Jakob-Kaiser Haus, home to 2000 offices hosting staff members and parliamentary employees. The other two buildings, located on both sides of the Spree River, are connected by a bridge. The Paul-Löbe Haus has 1000 offices for the members of parliament and the Marie-Elisabeth Lüders Haus has the parliamentary library. Highlight of the tour was climbing up inside the glass and steel dome to access the Reichstag's roof, where beautiful clear panoramic scenes over the city were not possible 30 years ago with its significant air pollution.

After lunch at Einstein Restaurant Unter den Linden, we walked to the Museum of Islamic Art located in the Pergamon Museum for a guided tour inside impressive reconstructions of ancient buildings, including the Market Gate of Miletus (Roman Empire). Smaller, but just as impressive, was the Aleppo Room, a reception room with the original wall panelling from the Ottoman Period. Carved by a Persian artist in 1603, the panelling depicts biblical scenes, and features the Virgin Mary, Christ, and his disciples. A must-see exhibit was the iconic bust of Nefertiti, principal wife of Egyptian pharaoh Akhenaten, believed to have been crafted around 1345 BC and discovered by a German archaeological team in 1912.

We set off Sunday for Potsdam, Capital of the German state of Brandenburg, and residence of the Prussian kings and the German Kaiser until 1918. Our main goal was a walking tour at the grounds of Sanssouci Palace, summer residence of Prussian King Frederick the Great, well known for its beautiful garden with vineyard terraces and an originally preserved 18th century interior.

We continued in the afternoon walking through Potsdam with its 1000-year-old past as Imperial Capital and garrison town of the Prussian kings. It is also the place where Hitler's Reichstag held a meeting for the first time in 1933. In 1945, the Potsdam Agreement sealed the end of the Nazi regime at the Cecillienhof Palace. We also visited the military historic museum with its many aeroplanes, helicopters, unmanned, and anti-aircraft systems at Airfield Berlin-Gatow, formerly used by the German Luftwaffe and British Royal Air Force.

On Sunday evening we gathered at the Divan, an Arabic Culture House in Berlin, hosted again by Abdulla. We thanked our dear friend for his generous



hospitality and his perfect arrangements for us. Our British friends, Martin and Mandy Vine, offered to host the next reunion in 2025 and this proposal was unanimously accepted.

CHAIR UPDATES

Chair of Executive and Strategic Leadership

My service as the Chair of Executive and Strategic Leadership comprises two principal duties or, really, privileges. First, I serve as an educator for students in the Carlisle Scholars Program, which I direct. My educational focus is on cultivating leaders who are adept at strategic problem-solving in any context. My teaching colleagues and I realize this vision by administering weekly in-depth exercises that enable the students to develop skills in the conduct of original research, analytical collaboration, and policy and strategy formulation. By the time our students complete their sixth month here, they will have engaged in no fewer than 15 research-driven, two-day exercises on a range of historical and contemporary challenges. This approach is unique in American military and policy education.

My second role as Chair is to conduct outreach for the College with an emphasis on leader development within national-security contexts. Outreach can take the form of showcasing the work that USAWC faculty are doing, including my work on ethics, military and policy leadership, and the relationship between the military professional and various ways of understanding politics.

I recently presented my research at several academic conferences, including at the International Studies Association in Montreal, Canada; the Southern Political Science Association St. Pete's, Florida; the Department of Social Sciences Security Seminar, West Point, New York; and the Midwest Political Science Association in Chicago, Illinois.

I also presented talks on the theme of "Strategy, Ethics, and Due Diligence," emphasizing the obligation for senior military and national-security leaders to conduct—on their own and in collaboration with others—rigorous, theory-informed analysis requisite to understand the policy and strategic problems they encounter. I gave short versions of this talk to the faculty and leadership of Joint Special Operations University in Tampa, Florida; participants at the Irregular Warfare Center's conference on military education in Arlington, Virginia; and the International Society of Military Ethics in Athens, Greece.



A great honor was leading one week's worth of instruction on the theme of "Thinking Strategically" to senior leaders in the Defence and Strategic Studies Course at the Australian War College in Canberra. The themes included critical thinking, cognitive bias and misperception, collective-action problems, and systems thinking and complexity. The week ended with the students applying the lesson material to the challenge China presents to the international community.

In Paris this spring, five students in the Carlisle Scholars Program participated in a series of professional forums, formal training in debate techniques, and an actual debate of two mixed teams comprising students from both France's Ecole de Guerre and the U.S. Army War College. Much of the professional discussions centered on the war between Russia and Ukraine, as well as the international role played by the People's Republic of China. The students' formal debate centered on whether the U.S. or China has an advantage over the other with respect to the development of emerging technologies such as artificial intelligence. Our colleague in Paris, Ms. Emily Cleret, did a tremendous job structuring a week's worth of challenging experiences for our students. Among the skills they strengthened through formal debate included the conduct of research, crafting arguments, oral communication, and thinking on one's feet. All leaders could benefit from such high-pressure education and training.

We expanded the Second Annual Strategy Competition in April to ten military education programs from the various Services, as well as three civilian policy schools. Each program sends one or two six-person teams to compete over three days. The students' task this year was to assess U.S. strategy towards China, assess weaknesses, and propose alternatives. Moreover, a team of Ph.D. researchers, led by Dr. Megan Hennessey at Air University, observed the various teams to identify patterns of strengths and weaknesses in how students researched, developed, and briefed their strategies. This year's final round featured a team from our National Security Policy Program and a team from the Air University's mid-career program, Joint All Domain Strategist Program. The USAWC team took the win after receiving tough questioning and fine-tuned feedback from the judges, including Ambassador (Ret) C. Steven McGann, Professor Stephen Biddle of Columbia University, Professor Risa Brooks from Marquette University, and BG (Ret) Kimberly Field, RES '08, the J5 of Special Operations Command. The competition allows student participants and their teachers to assess

the military- and policy-education programs. Hence, the competition creates an opportunity to improve how American and partnernation leaders confront national-security and military challenges.

In April, Dr. Neiberg and Prof. Daniel Krebs led students on a ten-day trip to Helsinki, Warsaw, and Paris to examine issues related to NATO and the Ukraine war with our allies and partners (see p. 13). This June, Dr. Neiberg delivered two talks at the Chalke Valley History Festival in Wiltshire, England. Chalke Valley is one of the largest gatherings of people interested in history held in Europe. He also attended the Royal Uniform Service Institute Conference on Landpower inside Westminster Abbey's conference center in London, an event attended by three former USAWC International Fellows, including Marcus Evans, IF-U.K, RES '15, BG Fernando Luis Moron Ruiz, IF-Spain, RES'15, and another from Bulgaria.



Dr. Neiberg continues his work to help government and defense organizations improve their ability to think historically and apply insights expertly and appropriately – historical mindedness. He is also a frequent contributor to the advancement of accurate and contextual history, not only with his own books but as a reviewer of others. He recently had a review of two books by Jade McGlynn published by the *Washington Post* titled, "What we've Misunderstood about Russian Motivations for the War in Ukraine."

De Serio Chair of Strategic Intelligence

Dr. Genevieve Lester will depart this fall after seven years as the Chair. She has traveled extensively representing the College on topics of strategic intelligence. She dedicated herself to helping establish a firm role in the academic discourse on intelligence and leadership through speaking, writing, and bringing senior officials to speak at the College. She worked with the Army staff and throughout the Army enterprise on issues of intelligence education and intelligence consumption. She also contributed to two studies on intelligence education while on special assignment to the Office of the Director of National Intelligence.

Dr. Lester has continued to publish and lecture internationally on oversight and accountability. Her books on covert action and the consumption of intelligence and technology will be coming out soon, to add to her other publications. She has organized and moderated a number of De Serio Lectures, culminating in this year's lecture with Director of the Central Intelligence Agency, William Burns. The Foundation dedicated this year's De Serio Lecture to Director Burns' late parents, MG and Mrs. Wm. F. Burns, RES '72, former Deputy Commandant, and former President of the Foundation. Mrs. Charlotte Watts, widow of Mr. Francis W. De Serio, RES '72 for whom the lecture is named, also attended the lecture in memory of her long-time friends, the Burns.

and the bronze class plaques. We still have coordination and many legal reviews to accomplish, but we are working as expeditiously as possible. Yes, we continue to need your help with funding, so please be generous in designating support for the Alumni Park/Hall to preserve the ways that all graduates are honored.





Since the big news for this edition of this magazine is that the new academic building is now occupied, we wanted to give you some answers to your most **frequently-asked questions**:

.....

Now that the College has occupied the new academic building, what will happen to the old Root Hall? Root Hall and Bliss Hall are scheduled for demolition (estimated 2025) and the ground they currently occupy will be returned initially to "green space." The Root Hall Gym will remain as is, and will continue as a fitness and wellness center for the Carlisle Barracks community.

Is the new academic building going to be called "Root Hall" and what will the address be? Yes, the "Root Hall" name has been transferred to the new academic building and the new address will be 651 Wright Avenue, Carlisle, PA 17013. Mail for the College and the Foundation will continue to find us using the 122 Forbes Avenue address for some time.

What will happen to the graduation plaques and the stained glass windows? In the not-too-distant future as part of the demolition prep that will be required, they will be moved into storage areas. The graduation plaques will be stored in a special area by the DPW and the stained glass windows will be stored professionally until they are ready for re-installation in the new Alumni Park and Hall in a few years. (See above)

Will the College continue with graduation plaques for future classes? Yes. There is no plan to change that time-honored tradition and there will be room in the new Alumni Park for decades more. There will be several years' delay with plaque dedications while the transition occurs.

What will happen to other class gifts that are not stained glass windows? Most class gift commissioned oil paintings have already been safely moved to the U.S. Army Heritage and Education Center. There are curation committees in place now to make decisions about the future display of the entire collection of artifacts across the Barracks and the College.

Will bricks from the old Root Hall be available as mementoes? The bricks on the old Root Hall are government property until declared otherwise. When a demolition contractor is identified, the Foundation will request consideration to obtain some number to make available as mementoes.

Has the Foundation Gift Shop moved to the new academic building? Yes, our Army War College Foundation Gift Shop and office spaces are colocated in the new academic building. As a private organization, we maintain our authorization to operate on Carlisle Barracks IAW AR 210-22.

Will there be a ribbon-cutting ceremony and tours of the new Root Hall at some point? As this magazine is going to press, the official ribbon-cutting ceremony is still being planned. Construction contractors will continue working for several months to complete all aspects of the new building so "open house" tours are not planned for the immediate future. We will do our best to keep you informed as the College's plans develop and are finalized.




Mr. President by W. Hugh Long, DCS'80. In this novel, John Rock was a country boy from humble beginnings, but that never stopped him from dreaming big. Always


Outnumbered 20-to-1: A Vietnam Biography by COL (Ret) William P. Collier, Jr., RES'84. Like many of his fellow soldiers and officers who returned home from the Vietnam War, Collier kept many of the stories

of his experiences to himself. However, there is one story that Collier knew had to be shared in his lifetime, the story of the Battle of Mo Duc-one of Vietnam's final high-intensity slugfests leading up to the signing of a peace agreement that would conclude the war. Then Major Collier and his team went into the Battle of Mo Duc believing it was a hopelessly unwinnable situation with all the odds stacked against them. Yet, even as they faced their seemingly sure defeat and certain death, they persevered to victory through what Collier feels can only be described as the grace of God. Collier's story is not only a story of perseverance and heroism, but of our communion with the divine fabric of existence itself.




Cold Sun: The Search for WWII Airmen Lost in a Tibetan Glacier by COL (Ret) William H. Jordan, RES'90. In January 1944, a U.S. Army Air Corps transport, enroute

to its home base in India, crashed into a remote snowfield in Tibet. The snowfield glaciated, completely hiding the aircraft until its accidental discovery by a Tibetan hunter in 1993. A nearby Chinese army garrison launched a reconnaissance of the site, brought out remnants of the plane and remains of the crew, and then notified the American Embassy in Beijing. Jordan, then commander of the U.S. Army Central Identification Laboratory in Hawaii, was assigned to investigate the site and to recover, identify, and repatriate the remains of the crew. He recounts these events, including the final, solemn duty of officially informing the family members of the fate of their loved ones. He weaves the mission of the aircraft and the crew's fate through the prism of America's history and progress recovering, identifying, and honoring our fallen warriors.



For Those Who Still Care: The Vietnam War, An Engineer's Story by COL (Ret) Ivan V. Beggs, DCS '93. With the context of the Vietnam War still debated after 50+ years


- how and why the U.S. became mired in student unrest, political assassinations, anti-war protests, civil rights, corrupt and incompetent Vietnamese governments, and U.S. leaders with doubts about the war — Beggs relates that his soldiers would ask, "Why are we here?" and he would most often respond, "Let's do our jobs and go home." He writes about how they served their country as engineers, not as fighters engaged in active combat, but quietly going about the nuts-and-bolts business of building and repairing roads, bridges, and infrastructure. They accomplished their missions through difficult conditions, including heavy workloads, drug abuse, racism, doubts about the war, arguments, homesickness, and heated discussions about getting the job done.

In the summer of 1969, as the Vietnam


War was being turned over to the South Vietnamese, then Lieutenant Raschke arrived in Chuong Thien Province deep in the Mekong Delta, eager to have a positive impact. Recounting his assignment to a provincial advisory team of military and civilian personnel, this memoir depicts the ordinary and the extraordinary of life both inside and outside the wire—mortar attacks, firefights and snipers, hot showers, good meals and comradery, the life and death struggles of the Vietnamese people, and the bonds he formed with them.



The Man Who Lived

This is a novel of science

This is a novel of science fiction and fantasy that examines the fragility

and duplicitous nature of what passes for history today. While some "history" claims to provide a clear picture of past events, the veracity of written and oral histories is suspect as not entirely complete nor true and faithful in reporting what transpired in the past. The reality of the phrase, "History is written by the victor," frequently skews what ends up being recorded. Thus, although it has exceptional, rare shining moments, what passes for history throughout the ages is an artificial exposition on warfare, human bloodshed, and savagery written by those who survived to tell their version of what happened. The novel suggests a unique remedy for laying bare the elusiveness of truth provided by a group of unbiased, immortal Watchers, who observe and record the unvarnished and undistorted doings of mankind throughout the ages with all its warts, thorns, and imperfections.




creation of a Jewish state. UNTSO quickly found itself overseeing the ceasefire lines between combatant parties. In the ensuing decades, as countries along the eastern Mediterranean engaged in a series of escalating military conflicts, UNTSO was continually challenged in its peacekeeping mission, often having to alter its configuration. Matters came to a head in 1982, when Israel invaded Lebanon for a second time, calling into question the efficacy of UN peacekeeping operations and U.S. support for them. As a former UN military observer with personal experiences of the conflict, Lingamfelter chronicles the role of the U.S. military in UN Middle East peacekeeping operations and examines the difficulties faced by UN forces wedged between warring sides with limited trust in their authority. This is a "boots on the ground" perspective of the Arab-Israeli tensions and geopolitics preceding the 1982 invasion of Lebanon.


illness as he rose through the ranks of the U.S. Army. As a successful Engineer officer, he was chosen to lead at virtually every level, to including leading the combat engineers who paved the way for troops to battle to Baghdad in 2003. Only years later would he learn how the pressure of organizing dozens of simultaneous lifeor-death missions each day altered the biochemistry of his brain. The Iraq War triggered what psychiatrists ultimately diagnosed as late-onset bipolar disorder, a chemical imbalance that sends sufferers whipsawing between grandiose imaginings and suicidal depressions. His increasingly erratic behavior led to his forced resignation as President of the National Defense University and ended his military career. He discusses why his condition went undiagnosed for so long and explores what can be done in and outside the Armed Forces to diagnose and treat mental illness. He provides a first-hand look at

available treatments, ranging from powerful medications to electroconvulsive therapy, and the role of family, friends, and caregivers.



The Girls Who Fought Crime: The Untold True Story of the Country's First Female Investigator and Her Crime Fighting Squad by MG (Ret) Mari K. Eder, Ph.D. DDE '01.

This book is about corsets, crime, and the woman who would help change modern policing forever, Mary "Mae" Foley. When women were fighting for the vote, Mae was also fighting crime in the heart of New York City with the New York Police Department, taking down rapists, bootleggers, Nazis, and serial killers. One of the first women to be sworn into the police force, Mae not only fought crime in the city that never sleeps, but also did something much bigger; she challenged the patriarchal systems that continually tried to shut her and other women down. The result of her efforts was a long career that helped over 2,000 women join her auxiliary police force, the 'Masher Squad.'

RES'09. The author was assigned to the U.S. Embassy in Nairobi, Kenya as the Financial Management Center Director, when on August 7, 1998, a truck bomb exploded outside. Minutes later, a second truck bomb exploded outside the U.S. Embassy in Dar es Salaam, Tanzania. She was off-site that morning or likely would not have been able to write this book about how she found herself to be a tiny hub on a "Deep State" wheel, with the spokes—the U.S. Department of State, Central Intelligence Agency, Department of Justice, FBI, and the military—all connecting to her because of money. After years as a federal auditor and then as a Foreign Service Financial Management Specialist, she became aware of and took actions regarding money

that, unbeknownst to her at the time, had linkages to covert operations. She describes what can happen when you innocently seek one truth, but discover quite another. While not a political story, it is certainly one with political overtones.



Getting Started:
An Introduction to
Systematic Theology
for Students and
Laymen, by CH (COL,
Ret) Ralph J. Gore Jr.,
DDE '10. Gore brings
more than thirty years of

Reformed theological teaching experience to this introductory guide to biblical, Christian theology. This is meant to help students and those new to or intimidated by theology "get started" in the right direction as they first learn about the God of the Bible. Gore explains key terms, historical movements, influential theologians, and different approaches to theological inquiry in a warm, approachable, and easy-tounderstand tone. He also teaches methods that anyone, regardless of experience, can use to integrate theology in a biblical and balanced fashion. For students, newcomers to Christianity, or anyone with an interest in Christian theology, this is a valuable introduction to what Gore hopes will be a lifelong journey.



Failure Is Not the Problem: It's Your Leadership by COL (Ret) George Milton, RES'12. Most people in positions of leadership and authority will only talk about how to become

successful when discussing leadership. In his book, Milton focuses primarily on how to become successful using your failed experiences. When he examines wildly successful people in all industries, he finds a common denominator is that they all learned how to understand, accept, embrace, and learn from their failures. 

The New Agent Orange: Comparing Dioxin Exposure in Vietnam to Gulf War Syndromes and Sicknesses by John A Siegfried, NSS '12. This work takes readers on a gripping journey


over decades through the hidden dangers and devastating health consequences faced by servicemen and women. It weaves together personal accounts from veterans and rigorous scientific research, demanding a critical reassessment of government healthcare providers. It lays bare the urgent need to confront the health issues that burden our service population and it advocates for expedient diagnoses and comprehensive support. The PACT Act has emerged as a glimmer of hope, expediting appointments and approving claims related to toxic exposure. Yet, formidable challenges persist on the path to justice and care for afflicted veterans. Siegfried paints a vivid and haunting portrait of the situation and urges society to honor the service of veterans by confronting the ongoing health crises head-on.



By exploring the challenges and triumphs he encountered on the battlefield, they showcase his resilience and selflessness in the face of adversity. Jon was also a

A chaplain stands with people in the most challenging moments of their lives, helping them to find the strength to navigate what are often life and death struggles. Relying on the Apostle Paul's paradoxical idea of strength through weakness (2 Cor. 12:9, NIV), Jaques postulates that powerlessness is not a curse to be vanquished, but is a state of grace to be embraced. Combining the discussions of a pair of fictional chaplains with interviews with real Army chaplains, Jaques describes a journey toward spiritual maturity through a set of five Attainments. The first Attainment is the acceptance of powerlessness; the fifth, a simple statement, "I am changed." This book is helpful for chaplains of every faith and denomination, and for caregivers at home and around the world.



General & Mrs. Earle Wheeler: Their Rise to Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff Amid America's Descent into Vietnam by COL (Ret) Mark A. Viney, former FAC. This is the

biography of U.S. Army General Wheeler, a member of the small, elite fraternity selected as Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. He became the senior military advisor to President Johnson in 1964 and continued in this capacity under President Nixon through 1970. In disgust with their administrations' Vietnam War policies, Wheeler shredded his memoirs and died three years later in 1975. Now, based on available correspondence,

recently declassified top-secret documents, interviews with participants and their memoirs, this book and its companion book by Viney, **Determined to Persist:** General Earle Wheeler, the Joint Chiefs of Staff, and the Military's Foiled Pursuit of Victory in Vietnam, enable you to trace the internal debates, tensions, and critical inflection points of the Vietnam War relating to the most senior officer of the U.S. Armed Forces at that time. General Wheeler's exceptional, 46-year military career and the vital roles played by his spouse are highlighted against the backdrop of growing American involvement in Southeast Asia.

STRATEGIC STUDIES INSTITUTE

The Strategic Studies Institute (SSI) and the USAWC Press continue to pursue excellence in research and publications for the U.S. Army. We continue our regionally-aligned research agenda covering significant areas of interest for combatant commands, Army Service Component Commands, and other senior leaders across the defense enterprise.

This spring we formally launched our year-long research project focused on the Korean Peninsula. This effort is examining the challenging dynamics of the U.S.-Korea alliance (now 73 years old), and the changing nature of security in northeast Asia. Part of this project will look at the nature of the U.S.-Japan-Korea trilateral cooperation and how it can foster higher levels of interoperability and security cooperation among the most important partners in the region. Other aspects will examine the evolution of the nuclear deterrent on the peninsula and how U.S. and Korean officials are maturing that aspect of the relationship. Most importantly, we will articulate how the Korean security establishment is finding nuanced ways to help preserve a free and open Indo-Pacific.

SSI continues its strong relationship with the NATO Centre of Excellence-Defense Against Terrorism (COE-DAT) and recently we were honored to participate in two events at their headquarters in Ankara, Türkiye. The Border Security in Contested Environments workshop brought in experts to discuss, examine, and share best practices in border security in non-permissive environments with the goal of providing practical recommendations for NATO and other partner nations. LTC Paul Milas presented on the topic of security challenges and terrorist activities in the eastern Democratic Republic of the Congo and Rwanda. At the end of June, Dr. Carol Evans, SSI Director, provided training support for NATO COE-DAT's basic and advanced Critical Infrastructure Security and Resiliency Against Terrorist Attacks programs.

SSI researchers continue to produce rigorous research in their respective fields and regions. **Dr. Bob Hamilton, USAWCF '09** has been in Mongolia and Kazakhstan doing field research for a book project on China-Russia relations. The goal of the research is to examine how they interact on the ground in countries where both have important interests at stake. **Dr. John R. Deni** traveled to Bucharest, Romania and Berlin, Germany in late June, conducting research meetings in support of a research project co-authored with National Defense University's Dr. Lisa Aronsson on the role of European allies in supporting Ukraine. **Dr. Evan Ellis** and **Dr. Deni** each delivered a guest lecture to the Romanian National Defence College's student body on the future of NATO defense and deterrence posture in Europe. **Dr. Tony Pfaff** attended the International Symposium on Military Ethics conference in Athens, Greece and presented his paper "Ukraine and the Ethics of Conflict Termination."

CENTER FOR STRATEGIC LEADERSHIP (CSL) UPDATE

POLAR BEARS

MG Brian Eifler, RES '12, CG, 11th Airborne Division, met virtually with members of the Army War College "Polar Bears" on March 16, 2023 to discuss their group research project on developing strategic relationships with indigenous people of the Arctic. AY23 Resident students COL Todd Fitzpatrick, COL Kevin Miller, Amy Brayshaw, and Distance student LTC Deborah Fisher, discussed their project and received important insights and feedback.



Four students, COL Davin Bridges, LTC Jeremy Nelson, LTC Deborah Fisher, and COL Shannon Thompson, we re virtual panelists on their group research project on April 6, 2023 at the University of North Georgia Conference on Human Security. Dr. Charles Pfaff of Strategic Studies Institute was one of the conference coordinators and our panel was titled, "Putting the Past on Ice: Evolving Security Considerations Among Human Populations in a Warming Arctic."

It was a personal and professional privilege to spend Memorial Day weekend in Troy, Michigan with the Polar Bear Memorial Association. I met with the descendants of the real 31st Infantry Division* "Polar Bears," the 5,200 nearly forgotten U.S. soldiers who fought in northern Siberia in 1918-19 as part of the American Expeditionary Force in North Russia. Many of the Polar Bears are buried in the Whitehall Cemetery in Troy, as approximately 70% of the infantrymen were from Michigan, having been selected for the North Russian campaign because of their experience with extreme cold. The bodies of those who died in Russia were returned a decade later to the cemetery in Troy. The grandchildren of those Polar Bears were very touched that a faculty member from the U.S. Army War College "Polar Bears" came to visit them at their annual remembrance event. They showed me family photographs and

described the extreme service and sacrifice of their relatives who served or died in Russia as Polar Bears more than a hundred years ago, and they look forward to continued USAWC connections.

They discussed their group research project on command and control options in the Arctic, as well as their own specialty areas in cold weather engineering, paratrooper operations, and logistics in extreme environments. Several other students spoke at Dickinson College's Arctic Environmental Security Forum in April. COLBen Ogden, RES '17 was a fascinating guest lecturer on the links between Antarctica and Space during our elective.

CSL, along with the Office of the Assistant Secretary of the Army (Installations, Energy, and Environment) and the DoD's Ted Stevens Center for Arctic Security, sponsored a three-day **Environmental Security Workshop** in June 2023 focused on the two polar regions. Longrange strategic environmental security and intelligence issues impacting the Arctic and Antarctic regions were discussed by approximately 70 senior leader representatives from the DoD, DoE, State Department, National Science Foundation, NASA, and other key organizations. ADVANCED STRATEGIC ART PROGRAM

The Advanced Strategic Art Program (ASAP) wrapped up AY23 with the annual capstone staff ride to Sicily and Normandy. The group followed the progress of the Allied invasion of Sicily in July 1943 (Operation Husky) from the beach landings to the final evacuation of Axis troops from the island. Students were then able to assess the lessons taken from Sicily considering the Operation Overlord landings a year later in Normandy. Issues related to everything from statecraft and operational planning to defense management and strategic leadership were central to the staff ride discussions. The program finished the staff ride with an exchange at the Institute for Strategic Research at the Ecole Militaire in Paris. The focus issues for this year's presentations included Space, Lessons from the War in Ukraine, and NATO's potential response to the challenge of China. This was the 24th year the College has conducted the ASAP program.

U.S. ARMY HERITAGE AND EDUCATION CENTER (USAHEC)

Army Expo 23

Beginning this fall of 2023, USAHEC will build upon the well-established foundation laid over the years by Army Heritage Days, with a significant expansion of the program intended to better connect the American public with their Army, and to update the program into the future. In keeping with this dramatically expanded programming, Army Heritage Days will become "Army EXPO"- and the first year of this new event will be "Army EXPO 23" conducted **October 14-15, 2023**.

Army Heritage Days has been the flagship public program of the U.S. Army Heritage and Education Center (USAHEC) for well over a decade. This historically-themed event has presented nearly 250 years of Army history and heritage to tens of thousands of guests in south-central Pennsylvania; and has proven to be extremely successful at fulfilling USAHEC's mission of telling the Army story.

The focus of previous Army Heritage Days was on Army history and heritage. The most dramatic and obvious upgrade in future Army EXPO events will be a substantially increased presence of contemporary and future U.S. Army operations. Future Army EXPO visitors will interact with a full range of conventional and reserve component Army organizations; and will be able to learn how the future Army is envisioned to appear. Eventually, the goal of Army EXPO will be a balanced interpretation of heritage and history, the Contemporary Army, and the Army of the Future.



The U.S.Army Heritage and Education Center is where the Past Educates the Future – modern soldiers wearing developmental vision goggles traverse a recreated World War I trench.

For this year's Army EXPO event, Living Historians will continue their presence, demonstrating the history of the U.S. Army from the Colonial Militia of the French and Indian War, through the American Revolution. Reenactors will tell the story of World War I Doughboys, World War II and Korean War G.I.s, and the Grunts of Vietnam.

Programming that looks at the current Army will also be included in this year's event. USAWC teammates are working towards the Army Golden Knight's parachute team having a presence. Today's Pennsylvania National Guard will contribute one or more pieces of Army equipment to include modern 155mm howitzers, ballistic radars, a range of military vehicles, Unmanned Aerial Vehicles (UAVs) and a UH-60 Blackhawk helicopter to this year's expanded event. Contemporary U.S. Army bands and special groups will make appearances. Army recruiters will bring a trailer filled with interactive, educational exhibits for our younger audiences. Regional Veterans' groups will also be well represented with table displays.

The new Army EXPO 23 is an integrated U.S. Army War College (USAWC) event. The various Schools, Center, Institutes and Programs (SCIPs) at the USAWC will be represented. For example, guests can anticipate multi-purpose rooms at USAHEC being filled with wargames utilized by the Army War College's Center for Strategic Leadership to train our nation's future warfighters, robotics, special lectures or presentations from USAWC students and faculty, and displays that look at how USAWC is experimenting with technology and modernization.

There will be an increased emphasis on the myriad of contributions that Department of the Army civilians make every day at USAWC. As Army EXPO gathers momentum, the intent is for the full realm of USAHEC facilities to be maximized.

LTG (Ret) Richard G. 'Dick' Trefry, RES'69 was the President of the Alumni Association of the U.S. Army War College from 2003 until 2008, having been the Vice President twice before that, back to 1989. And in 2008, he took on an even bigger role as he and LTG (Ret) Richard F. 'Rich' Timmons, RES '84 accomplished what others had been contemplating for years, and that was to create the future with an historic merger of the Alumni Association with the Army War

College Foundation. LTG (Ret) Trefry became Vice President of the new merged Foundation and made sure it was successful before turning it over to a new Vice President in 2010.
